Cause of Unrest Autocratic Government.

Recently mention was made of the efforts to induce the Dominion Government to appeal to the country through the holding of a general election. We also mentioned that we did not think that in the west there was any demand for an election just now.

"W. L. Mackenzie King has again and again insisted that one of the remedies for the unrest which now prevails throughout Canada is a return to responsible government. It is upon this ground that he demands that a general election be held so that a government and parliament which really represent the people of Canada, will take the place of a government and parliament whose mandate has expired and which no longer possesses the confidence of the country.

Election A Remedy.

"The remedy for all this is a general election, which will result in giving Canada a government and a parliament which really represent public sentiment as it is today. It is possible that such a parliament would contain many new men and new elements and represent new schools of thought."

Canadians are Sane and Progressive.

"The people of Canada are sane and moderate. There is not the slightest danger of Bolshevism making any headway in Canada. The history of Canada is one of progress along moderate and constitutional lines and there is not the slightest doubt that in this respect history will repeat itself."

"The best rallying ground for men and women who are at once moderate and progressive, is the Liberal party. The Liberal party does not profess to accept all the new ideas which have come to the surface in the present ferment of new thought, but it is open minded. It does not believe in suppressing thought or speech. It is not afraid of new ideas. It regards it as a sign of health that men and women today are thinking for themselves instead of accepting without thought the ideas of so-called men of light and leading."

The time used in Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight. The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

RAILWAY BOARD AND THE CITY

Will Perhaps Discuss the Morse Creek Bridge, Cow Bay and Assessment.

As a result of an inquiry made by Alderman McLennan last night as to progress on the Morse Creek bridge, certain questions which may be brought up at the impending visit of the Railway Commission were suggested. It appears that all that stands in the way of the starting of the bridge is the endorsement of the latest city plans by the railway commission, for the railway has already endorsed them.

The mayor suggested that the city should have its case ready to present when the commission came. The Cow Bay matter and the railway assessment were mooted as possible questions. Alderman Dybhavn stated that he had seen a letter from Mr. Carvell, the chairman, telling that any local matters would be taken up. Therefore it would be up to the city to get started on its case without being further notified.

FINES FOR THOSE BREAKING GAME ACT

Provincial Government Collects \$195 From Hunters Without Licenses.

S. Wilson was fined \$50 with the option of 30 days' imprisonment by Magistrate McMullin yesterday afternoon, having pleaded guilty to the charge of killing two deer without license. Fred Stephens was charged with killing a deer without license and pleaded not guilty, stating that he had shot no deer on the day in question. The charge was dismissed and he was fined \$10 for carrying firearms without a license.

E. Hellman was fined \$10 for carrying firearms without license. R. E. Lewis was fined \$50 with the option of 30 days for shooting two deer without license. A. B. Nicholls was fined \$25 or thirty days for shooting one deer without license. O. A. Johnson was fined \$50 or thirty days for shooting two deer without license.

The firearms were returned to the accused.

BEVERAGE LICENSE REFUSED J. D. FARGO

Was Partner of McDougall in Turf Buffet Which Was Out of Business.

The application of J. D. Fargo for a beverage license was turned down by the council last night and the permission refused despite the recommendation of the chief of police that it be granted. The premises applied for are 710 Third Avenue West.

It was pointed out by the mayor that Fargo was the late partner of McDougall in the Turf Buffet which license was revoked last week, McDougall having been found guilty of an infraction of the B. C. Prohibition Act.

Alderman Perry moved, and Ald. Murray seconded, that the license be granted on the recommendation of the chief of police, but Aldermen Rochester, McLennan, Dybhavn and Kerr all voted against it, so the recommendation was thrown out.

SIXTY JEWELLERS ARE OUT ON STRIKE

Are Demanding Minimum Wage of \$36 a week from Employers

VANCOUVER, Sept. 8.—As a result of a wage dispute between the working jewellers and their employers, 60 union jewellers went on strike yesterday. They are asking for a minimum wage of \$36 a week.
