Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$6 an acre; second-class to 13.50 An Acre. Pre-emption new confined to sur veyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only

and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective Pre-emptore must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than & years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of Ill-health, on other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent resi dence may be issued, provided appli

cant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required. PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serv-ing with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made re-

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions. Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from en-

listment to March 21, 1920. BUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN

Provision made for issuance Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be listributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1930.
