Synopsis of

Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$1 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surface land only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence. Each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres, before receiving Crown grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of illness or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 2 years.

Pre-emption of 10 acres or more, cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emption of Crown grant may require another pre-emption. If he requires land in conjunction with his farm, where necessary, improvements provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANT ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining in pre-emption with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or assigns of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Association for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

WINNIPEG PEOPLE SPEND SUMMERS AT LAKE RESORTS

WINNIPEG, Sept. 18.—There has been a great development of the "week-end" habit among Winnipeggers this summer. The city's summer resorts have had increased popularity, equally among those who camp at the lakes for their vacation periods, or who go down for the Saturday-to-Monday outing.

Many thousands of young people have patronized evening trains to Winnipeg Beach and Grand Beach for the bathing and dancing—"Moonlights," these trains are called by the railroads; "Spoonlights" by the jocular. These beaches on Lake Winnipeg have the advantage of being comparatively close to the city, but they do not by any means exhaust the resources of the district for those on recreation bent.

The Lake of the Woods district claims its devotees in greater numbers every year, and in addition to the hundreds of Winnipeg people who have their own cottages, many of them their own islands, the hotels at Minaki, Kenora and Keewatin lake down around the eastern boundary of Manitoba or just across the line in Ontario, and the season is close when the duck hunters come into their own.

SEA LION CATCH

King of Hunters Collects Bounty Amounting to \$580

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 18.—William M. Hunter, known here as "king" of sea-lion hunters, recently collected \$880 bounty from the state for 52 sea-lion scalps, paid at the rate of \$2.50 each. Bounty is paid on the sealions because they are considered the Pacific coast salmon's worst enemy. They gather off the mouth of the Columbia River here to prey on fish bound upstream.

Sea-lion hunting is dangerous, Hunter says, and he tells of narrow escapes from angry bulls. Seals, he asserts, are not as awkward as they appear, but can travel fast. Recently one chased him over the rocks but was killed by Hunter's companion before it reached him.

Hunter works from a small launch while at sea. Much of his hunting is done on rocky beaches where seals congregate. He learned his trade—as he terms it—as a mountaineer hunting bear and deer in the Cascade Mountains.

In addition to the government bounty, Hunter is paid by salmon cannerymen for destroying seals. Estimated on the 1919 pack the rate of the cannery bounty would be about \$2,000 for every 1,000 sea-lions killed.

Sea-lions destroy the fish by snapping off their heads, it is said. During the salmon running seasons in the spring, tons of the fish are victims of the sea-lion herds.

Skins of the sea-lions are used extensively in glove manufacturing. Oils and fats also are products.


