H. HULATT IS NEW CHAIRMAN

Chosen Head of Telephone and Telegraph Division of the American Railway Association.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 25.—At the closing session of the telephone and telegraph division of the American Railway Association held at the Fort Garry Hotel yesterday H. Hulatt, manager of telegraphs on the Grand Trunk railway system with headquarters at Montreal, was elected chairman for the ensuing year. This is the highest honor that can be paid to an executive of the telegraph department of any railroad.

Mr. Hulatt is well known in Winnipeg, having as a matter of fact, commenced his telegraph career in Canada in Winnipeg and was actively connected with the construction of the telegraph lines of the Grand Trunk Pacific and organization of the G. T. P. Telegraph Company of which he is manager and director.

Mr. Hulatt is an associate member of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers and a member of the "Telegraph and Telephone" committee of that organization. He is also a member of the Canadian Engineering Standards Association and in addition is chairman of the sub-committee on "Inductive Interference" of the Railway Association of Canada. In 1913 he was appointed commercial and traffic superintendent of the G. T. P. Telegraph Company with headquarters at Winnipeg, in charge of lines west to the Pacific and was promoted in October, 1915, to his present position, having jurisdiction not only over the Grand Trunk and G. T. P. lines in Canada, but also Grand Trunk lines in the United States.

It is gratifying that a Canadian has been elected head of such an important international organization.
