The League believes that a moderate law which respects the rights traditional to our race will command the respect of the public, and that a moderate law which is not too strict is much more to be desired than a law which is too rough-shod over the public and earns only their contempt.

The Moderation League urges the electorate to support its efforts to substitute for the present Prohibition a measure of Government Control which shall embody the platform of the League. This was published in every newspaper in the Province in the early part of the present year, and is as follows:

The Moderation League's Platform:

- 1. The repeal of the Prohibition Act.
- 2. The restoration of the saloon or bar, for the sale of intoxicating liquors.
- 3. The Government sale and Government Control of spirituous and malt liquors in sealed packages.
- 4. The guarantee by the Government, as such vendor, of the pure quality of all spirituous and malt liquors, and the sale of same at reasonable prices.
- 5. The inculcation of true temperance principles consistent with personal liberty.
- 6. The elimination of the cause of the deplorable loss of respect for the laws of the land engendered by the Prohibition Act.

As has been done away with forever by universal Government Control will ensure the sale of pure quality, at local centres throughout the Province, in quantities consistent with moderation and temperance, and will provide proper safeguards against

for the purpose of carrying out the objects and aims of this platform the Moderation League advocates the formation by the Government of an independent non-partisan commission to control the sale of spirituous and malt liquors in sealed packages, such commission to be composed of citizens fully representative of the electorate.

CENTRAL HEATING PLANT IN KETCHIKAN

Proposal to Install One to Serve All Business Places.

KETCHIKAN, Oct. 11.—A special committee of the Commercial Club has in hand a proposal to establish a central heating plant in this city that will serve all the downtown business premises.

J. C. Corbin, a Seattle engineer, visited the city to study conditions with a view to the establishing of the plant and in addressing the club said there was no question as to its economy.

The proposal has been made as a result of the shortage of fuel oil which is used in most of the local heating plants. Many of the buildings are not suited to the installation of coal furnaces, hence the idea of the central plant which would serve them all.
