CALGARY, Oct. 12 .- An enormous crowd gathered last night H. to welcome W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party in Canada. Not only that but it was intensely enthusiastic.

William Duff, M. P., a member of Mackenzie King's party, made a scathing attack on Hon. C. C. Ballantyne. "We are asked to vote money and pass legislation after that legislation has been put into effect," he said, instancing the construction of 63 ships for the Canadian merchant marine by order in council.

"Ballantyne's contradiction of Mr. King's statement made in Vancouver to the same effect was not true. I make the statement no my reputation as a member of parliament that what Mackenzie King said was absolutely correct and that Mr. Ballantyne deliberlately intended to deceive the public.
