A German gun was shipped to Prince Rupert on September 29 from the War Trophies office at Toronto for the use of the city as a souvenir. A letter last night was read at the city council charging the officials that it was not properly taken care of on its arrival here.

On motion of Ald. Rochester, seconded by Ald. Perry, the city council last night refused the application of Building Inspector W. A. Matheson for four months' leave of absence to visit New Zealand. It was the feeling of the board that no city official could be allowed to take such an extended leave.

A letter from Peter Black to the city council complaining of the condition of the walk on First Avenue between Sixth and Seventh streets was referred last night to the Board of Works. It was also pointed out that the walk there was not put in by the city and the persons who put it in were responsible for its upkeep. Alderman Rochester favored tearing it up until a proper one was put in.

At last night's council meeting Ald. Rochester took exception to the manner in which three transformers costing \$234 apiece had been ordered by the utilities department without coming before the council. It was his opinion that orders of this amount should come before the council. It was pointed out by Superintendent Duncanson that they had been ordered in emergency and the lowest quotation had been taken advantage of.
