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BASKETBALL IS STARTED WELL

Big Crowd Attended Reorganization Meeting Last Night—Officers Elected.

MEMBERS URGED TO JOIN ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

A large and representative crowd was on hand in the council chamber last evening for the reorganization meeting of the basketball association. Officers were elected and it was decided to hold an executive meeting next Tuesday night when all teams that desire to enter competition in the various leagues are to be registered and general arrangements for the carrying out of the winter's sport will be discussed.

It was decided to use the Agricultural Hall for the games this year and it was strongly urged by E. A. Donohue, J. C. Brady and W. E. Thompson that the members of the basketball association turn out in force at the next meeting of the athletic association and take advantage of the offer of the officers of that association to come into control of that association and its assets. It was felt that a combination of the two bodies would work to the advantage of the basketball association and sport in general.

C. C. Clementson stated that the Exhibition Hall with its shower-baths and conveniences was the best place in town to conduct the games and no heavy gate fee would have to be relied upon to clear expenses.

Many Teams Enter.

From the reports brought in at the meeting last night there are to be a great number of basketball teams this year in senior, intermediate and junior competition and ladies are going to take part as well as boys.

Mr. Brady reported that there were no less than four ladies' teams at the high school and some stated that there are nine ladies' teams altogether. Juniors and intermediates are also planning and, in fact, there were several of their representatives at the meeting last night. Besides this there is to be a senior league lineup better than ever before. From all appearances the exhibition building should be kept busy every night this winter with at least one game of basketball.

All boys under 16 are to be included in the Junior League. The fee for senior men's teams this season is to be \$5; for intermediates and ladies' seniors, \$2; ladies' intermediates and all juniors will be required to pay no entry fee.

Collection will be Made on that Occasion for Boys' Naval Brigade.

October 21 is Trafalgar Day and that famous and memorable anniversary will mark the climax of a campaign throughout Canada to be carried on under the auspices of the Navy League. The direct object of the campaign will be to secure the needed funds to finance and carry on a permanent educational policy in Canada, for the avowed purpose of fostering the sea instinct in Canada, educating our youth to the traditions of the British Navy, and of impressing upon the public of Canada the important part our commerce on the seas plays in the national life of the country and the Empire.

Local Activity

In Prince Rupert there is to be a tag day on that day and the funds raised on that occasion will be devoted to providing for the needs of the local naval brigade. The Heate, which is being rebuilt under direction of Captain McGoskrie, it is expected will be ready by about that time and the brigade will then get down to practical training. Uniforms for the boys have been ordered and everything will be ready for a good start.

All through Canada a revival of interest in the work of this organization has been manifested through the instigation of those comparatively few whose zealous enthusiasm for the objects of the league has never slackened and this campaign will mark the definite start of a policy that has been recognized since the war as essential to the wellbeing of the Dominion—namely, a constant effort of interest and education which will keep alive in the hearts of the Canadian people, and particularly the young, that interest in and responsibility for the highways of the seas which mean so much to Canada's daily commercial life, her national security and the safety of the Empire.
