## DUMONT GUILTY MURDER CHARGE

Cyril Raymond was Killed by Blow Followed by Strangulation

NORTH BAY, Oct. 14.—Hector Dumont was found guilty of the murder of Cyril Raymond at Sturgeon Falls in April of last year. In bringing in their verdict the jury, who were out two hours and forty minutes, recommended mercy to the accused, because of "the lack of certain evidence," according to the foreman.

Dumont was not arrested until a year after Raymond met his death following a quarrel in the latter's home.

The story of the tragedy, as revealed by the testimony given in court here today, indicated that domestic relations at the Raymond home were of an unfortunate sort. Cyril Raymond, the dead man, was declared by his nineteen year old widow to have been jealous of her conduct.

Struck with a Bottle

Cyril Raymond returned home on the night of April 23, 1919, about 11 o'clock, to find his wife just back from a buggy drive with the two accused. Dumont was then inside the house, which he owned and which Raymond rented, and words passed between them, Raymond objecting to the presence of his landlord in the building. Raymond, according to his wife, turned to seize an axe with which to eject Dumont, whereupon the latter struck him with "an ordinary rye" bottle, felling him to the floor. Mrs. Raymond then went upstairs, but, coming down a minute later, saw Dumont and Laberge, between them, carrying out the limp form of Cyril Raymond to the buggy which was still standing outside. Afterwards she heard the horse and rig drive away.

Contradicts Young Wife

Laberge gave a straight denial of several parts of Mrs. Raymond's story and said she must "have some reason of her own" for fastening the crime on the prisoners. It was not true, he stated, that he helped to carry Raymond to the buggy after he had been struck by Dumont.

Raymond was not seen again until about two weeks later, when his dead body was found in some bush at Sturgeon Falls. There was then on the right side of the face a large wound the size of a hen's egg. Dr. Calonne said, while around the neck, and embedded deeply into the flesh was a piece of rope with a slipknot in it.

Concussion and Strangulation

The medical testimony was to the effect that death was caused by the combination of a "forcible blow with a blunt instrument" and the fastening of the rope; and in this statement Dr. Calonne was corroborated by Dr. Aubin. Concussion of the brain, followed by strangulation, took place, the doctors said, and they added that the rope had been applied to the man's neck before death.

## CURIOUS DISCOVERIES

Prehistoric Wizard's Den Found in Cave—Other Curious Objects.

PARIS, October 14.—Two discoveries that throw light on prehistoric times have been made in Central France. In the cave of the "Three Brothers," at Montesquieu a wall-painting, made in elemental colors of black and yellow has been found by savants. It is apparently 15,000 years old. It represents a man, walking to the left, naked and bearded with stripes. His body is leaning forward, with his arms in front and hands joined, "as in a cakewalk," says a learned report of the Academie des Sciences. On his head is a sort of mask representing a stag, and a horse's tail is bound on his loins.

Professor Bégouin thinks that it represents a primitive sorcerer in the exercise of his mysteries, and that the cave in question was a prehistoric wizard's den.

The second find was made by a boy Jack Bouillot, on the last day of his holidays. While watching some workmen occupied in blasting operations he perceived a hole seeming to go into the interior of the mountain, and crawling in he found a cavern of large dimensions. On the floor were various objects, not yet identified, and an enormous bone—the leg bone of a mammoth say the scientists.
