Provincial Election In Near Future.

There will be a provincial election in the near future, unless all signs fail. Attorney-General Farris intimated so in an address at Vancouver and on that account it will be time to begin thinking about it as soon as the prohibition plebiscite is over. Realizing that the people are hopelessly divided on the question of prohibition, the Government is taking no part in the campaign, but simply putting it up to the people themselves to decide what they want. Whatever the people decide to do, the Government will carry out. That is the democratic method. They could not do otherwise in a country where the people are the arbiters.

People are Still Talking of Sugar.

The sugar fiasco is still the subject of conversation. There is no debate, as all are agreed that the attempt to hold up the price of one of the necessities of life in an arbitrary manner would not be tolerated. Just how the Dominion Government will come out of it, no one can say. It looks as if these commissions and boards were being used by the Government to carry out the wishes of the big interests and that an effort was being made to hold themselves blameless. What is certain is that if the people had not been heard, the order would have gone into effect and remained indefinitely. As it is, the order will be set aside.

Veracity of Dr. Ernest Hall.

A correspondent whose letter we publish today under the nom de plume of "John Barleycorn" makes some slighting references to the veracity and experience of Dr. Ernest Hall, one of the best known and most reliable physicians and surgeons in Canada, several of whose letters have appeared in this paper.

Dr. Hall has practised in Victoria and Vancouver for the past forty years and he could tell hundreds of true stories of the horrors of the drink traffic. As a result of his experiences he is a pronounced prohibitionist, so imbued with the necessity of stopping the traffic that he gives an immense lot of his valuable time to lecturing against it and loses thousands of dollars a year through his aggressiveness in the cause. No one that knows him would ever speak of him as a fledgling or as getting his information from facts. He has the real goods.

However Dr. Hall is not the issue in this campaign, neither is any other man or woman an issue. The issue is "wet" or "dry," and judging from all accounts that come in, it is likely to be dry.

Correspondents Forget Rules as to Time.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE POSITION OF
ASSISTANT FOREST RANGER.

Object.
These examinations are for the purpose of filling present vacancies and to enable candidates to qualify for future vacancies and increases in staff.

Assistant Forest Rangers.
Assistant Forest Rangers are employed during the fire season (May to September) inclusive of each year and this period is extended where possible by working on improvements such as trails, etc. Re-employment is made each year as long as satisfactory service is given. Promotion to the permanent staff is made by merit and examination as occasion offers. The salary is \$110.00 per month the first year and \$120.00 per month the next year. Travelling expenses are also paid.

Qualifications for Candidates.
Candidates must be British subjects resident in British Columbia for at least one year, of good character, good physical condition and with woods experience. They should have experience in fire fighting, possess the ability to organize work and handle men; and have knowledge of the Forest Act.

The examinations are partly written, partly oral and are designed to test the candidates' ability along the above lines. All statements made by applicants as to experience, education and fitness are subject to verification by the examining board. Preference is given to returned soldiers with the necessary qualifications.

THE EXAMINATIONS.
The examinations will be held at the places and on the dates named below. Each intending candidate should apply to the District Forester of his district for application forms and for information regarding the hour of the examination and the building in which it will be held. Application forms should be filled out and mailed back to the District Forester in time to reach him before the date of the examination.

OBJECT:

These examinations are for the purpose of filling present vacancies and to enable candidates to qualify for future vacancies and increases in staff.

Forest Rangers.
Forest Rangers are employed the full year. The salary is \$125.00 per month and board expenses. This is increased to \$140.00 per month the second year and \$150.00 per month the third year provided satisfactory service is given and sufficient marks are obtained in the examinations. Also there are opportunities for promotion to higher positions. Rangers who fail to qualify for the higher grades in their first examination may have an opportunity to re-examine at a subsequent range examination.

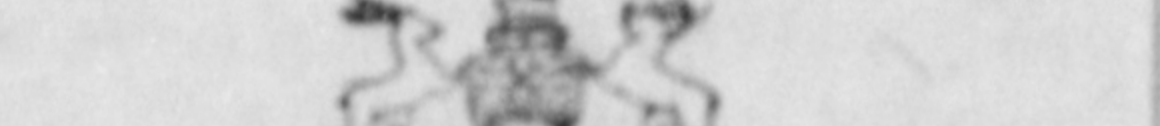
Qualifications for Candidates.

Candidates should be familiar with the practical work of a ranger, including cutting, surveying, and forest protection, possess a knowledge of the Forest Act, and have ability to organize work and handle men. The examinations are partly written, partly oral and are designed to test the candidates' ability along the above lines. All statements made by applicants as to experience, education and fitness are subject to verification by the examining board. Preference is given to returned soldiers with the necessary qualifications.
