#### **Provincial Election** In Near Future.

There will be a provincial election in the near future, unless all signs fail. Attorney-General Farris intimated so in an address at Vancouver and on that account it will be time to begin thinking about it as soon as the prohibition plebiscite is over. Realizing that the people are hopelessly divided on the question of prohibition, the Government is taking no part in the campaign, but simply putting it up to the people themselves to decide what they want. Whatever the people decide to do, the Government will carry out. That is the democratic method. They could not do otherwise in a country where the people are the arbiters.

### People are Still Talking of Sugar.

The sugar flasco is still the subject of conversation. There is no debate, as all are agreed that the attempt to hold up the price of one of the necessities of life in an arbitrary manner would not be tolerated. Just how the Dominion Government will come out of it, no one can say. It looks as if these commissions and boards were being used by the Government to carry out the 'wishes of the big interests and that an effort was being made to hold themselves blameless. What is certain is that if the people had not been heard, the order would have gone into effect and remained indefinitely. As it is, the order will be set aside.
