NO WAGE INCREASE FOR CARETAKER OF THE CITY CEMETERY

A recommendation of the board of works to grant Harry Smith, cemetery caretaker, an increase of salary to \$140 a month failed to carry at the meeting of the city council last night after considerable discussion.

Alderman Rochester suggested that the matter should be discussed

in committee of the whole but to this Alderman Perry objected and it was decided to take the matter up at once.

Ald. Rochester said this was a vexatious question. In a month or two they would be leaving office, some of them never to return. Mr. Smith was a good man but it was the principle they were dealing with. The cost of living had not gone up recently but the tendency was downward. If they took action in this particular case they would stir up a hornet's nest among the city employees and this should not be done. They should not keep raking up this matter of wage increases. They should get along for the balance of the year. Mr. Smith doubtless earned every dollar he got but the alderman thought the application should go over to the first of the year.

Alderman Kerr in supporting the motion for an increase said every case should be dealt with on its merits. Any adjustment made at the beginning of the year would doubtless be downward. Acting Mayor Dybhavn said he was personally opposed to the motion. The cost of living was coming down and at this late hour in the life of the council it would not be good judgment to grant the request.

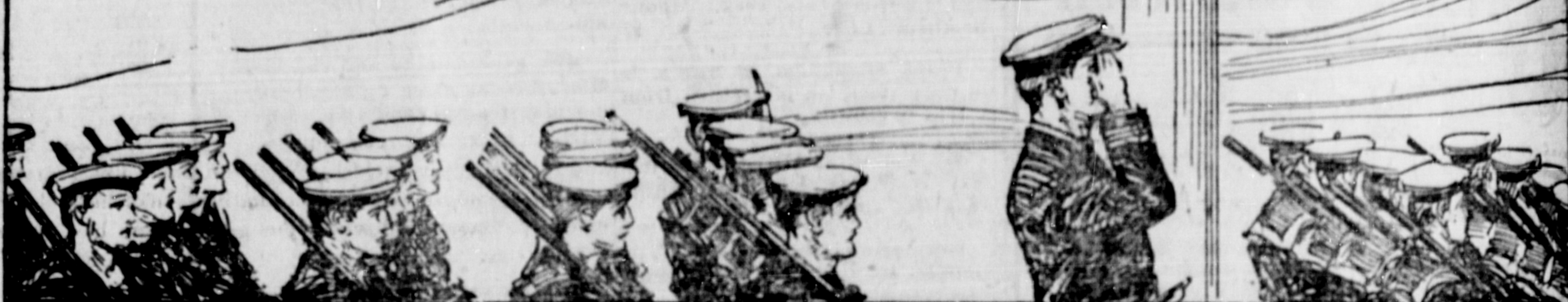
Alderman Perry urged that Mr. Smith was doing dangerous and unpleasant work and that he had a long family.
