LILLY GIVEN LIFE SENTENCE

Man Convicted of Murdering Woodworth on Gas Boat goes to McNeil's Island

Weeping copiously but silently, E. C. Lilly appeared before Judge Robert W. Jennings in the District Court and was sentenced to life imprisonment at hard labor at McNeil's Island for the murder of Billy Woodworth on August 25 last, for which crime he was recently convicted, says the Juneau Empire.

Lilly was brought into the court room before Judge Jennings ascended the bench. He was seated with his attorney J. B. Marshall apparently composed, showing little or no sign of agitation.

Immediately on the opening of court, Judge Jennings summoned the prisoner before the bar, the latter being accompanied by Mr. Marshall. Being asked by the court if either had anything to say before sentence should be passed, both said no. Lilly's response being so low as to be almost inaudible and accompanied by a negative shaking of the head.

Sentence Imposed

Thereupon Judge Jennings imposed the sentence as follows:

"I do not know that there is anything that could be said. The jury found you guilty of murder in the first degree, without capital punishment, and the law fixes the punishment and the court has no discretion in the matter. It is not the court who is sentencing you so much as the law itself which sentences you. You were indicted by the Grand Jury, tried under the law of the land, had an attorney of your own choosing to defend you and a fair and impartial jury to pass upon your case. That jury found you guilty and the court has nothing to do but to do what the law says.

"It is the judgment of the court that you are guilty and it is the sentence of the court, under the law, that you be confined in the penitentiary at McNeil's Island, at hard labor, for the term of your natural life."

Lilly Breaks Down

As the court spoke, slowly and distinctly, tears formed in Lilly's eyes and began to flow in streams down his cheeks as he nervously shifted his weight from one foot to the other and made ineffectual efforts to control his emotion, wiping away the tears with a fresh white handkerchief. As soon as the court concluded, Lilly was led from the room by deputy U. S. marshals, his eyes dimmed and reddened. He was immediately taken to cell where he will remain until transferred to McNeil's Island.

COAL STRIKE NEGOTIATIONS

Premier Willing to Examine Any Proposal; Transport Men Restive

LONDON, October 20.—The parliamentary debate on the coal strike makes a settlement likely. Premier Lloyd George especially emphasized that no question of "amoral propriety" would prevent the Government from honestly, fearlessly and sincerely examining any project promising a settlement, having at the same time due regard to the public interest. He said that he favored increased wages if the output were increased.

At a cabinet discussion the labor men considered a proposal of William Peace, labor leader, that two shillings wage advance be granted until a permanent wage board was established.

It is considered probable that negotiations will be resumed.

The transport men are growing restive, orders having been issued to their unions throughout the country to have the strike organization ready.

J. H. Thomas announced that seventeen days ago a special meeting of the railways delegation received only one vote not to join the strike.

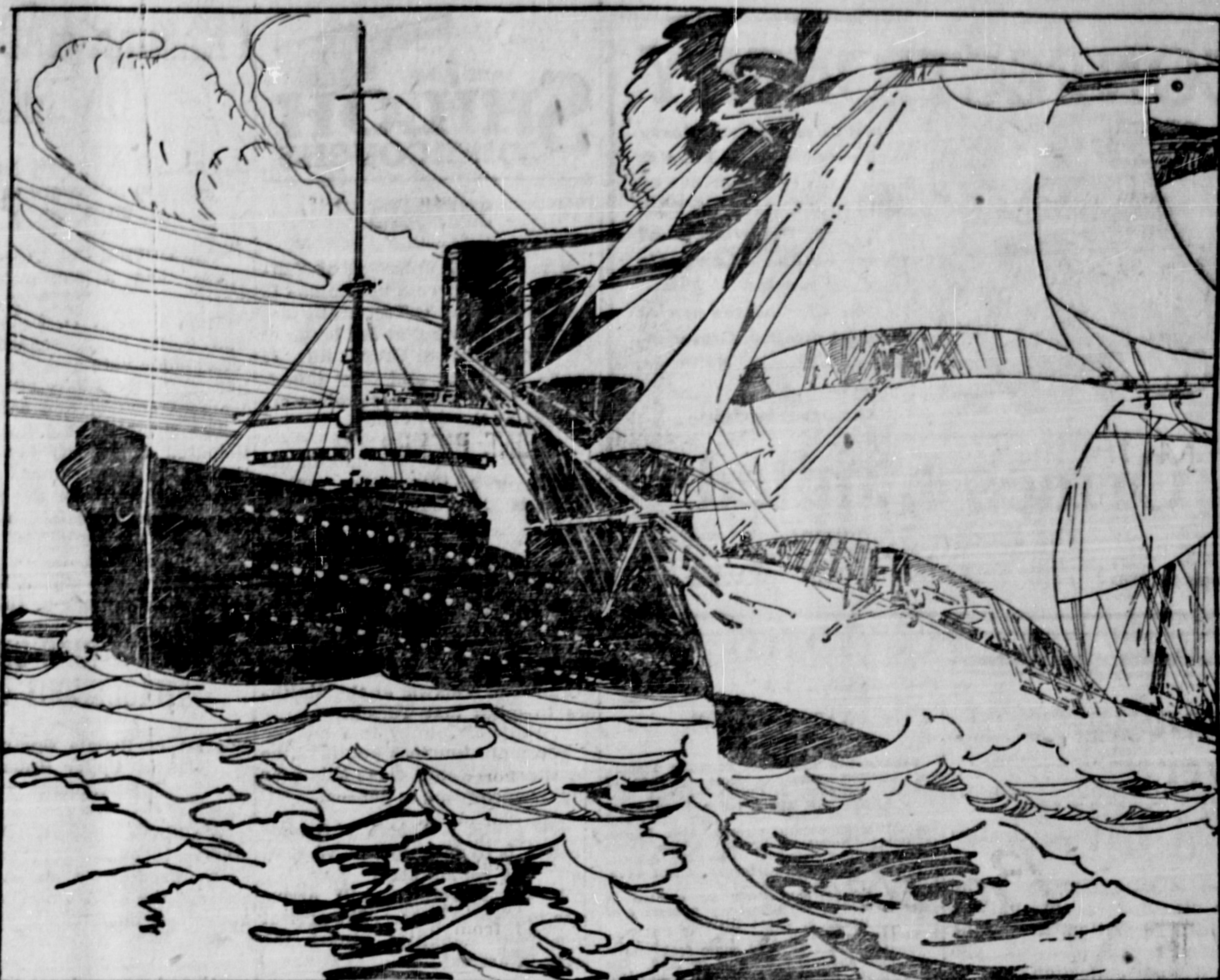
GOVERNMENT BOOK IS OUT

"Skeena Land Recording Division," by J. Gordon Smith, Just Received in City

The illustrated booklet, "The Skeena Land Recording Division," issued under the direction of Hon. T. D. Pattullo, member for Prince Rupert and minister of lands, has just been received in Prince Rupert and everyone who has seen it expresses pleasure with the value that the publication will have as a source of information and advertising. It consists of 47 pages and is replete with many fresh photographs which were taken during the past summer. Although published more with the idea of bringing the wealth of natural resources to the public eye the work mentions Prince Rupert freely. It is treated as the headquarters town and its industries are well described. The city is also well represented in pictures in the book.

Personal Work

The material for this publication was gathered during the spring and summer by J. Gordon Smith, who was here in May and June. Mr. Smith is connected with the publicity department of the Lands Office and is a writer of some experience, having done considerable work in the city of Victoria. He visited all the places he describes and took a large majority of the photographs which have been used to illustrate the work. Besides the general descriptive articles and the photos there is a plenitude of statistical figures which add to the value of the book as a reference.
