The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

Board of Trade to Write Canadian National Regarding Railway Guide.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade held yesterday in the Board of Trade rooms, the president and secretary were asked to write the Canadian National Railway official responsible for the general timetable drawing attention to the fact that Prince Rupert is not shown there as either a terminal point on the railway or as on the main transcontinental line.

There was considerable discussion in regard to the matter, in which it was shown that the timetable for western lines was much fairer to this city than the other.

Mr. Beaumont explained that apparently there had not been time to complete a new plate for a map showing the line coming here. Other important places were not shown on the line. Toronto, for instance, was missed. He felt sure this would be remedied in future timetables.
