PREMIER MINE LOOKING GOOD

H. A. Guess, Vice-President and General Manager, Got Back This Morning from Stewart

H. A. Guess, vice-president of the American Smelting and Refining Co., which company last year purchased a controlling interest in the Premier Gold Mining Co., returned this morning from Stewart on the Queen and leaves again tonight for Seattle. Mr. Guess is in charge of the mining operations of the American Smelting and Refining Co., and in his official capacity has been making an inspection of the Premier mine. He may return again during the course of the winter. His headquarters are in New York City.

Speaking to the News this morning, Mr. Guess expressed his pleasure at the appearance of the property. Development operations are bringing forth showings that come up to the most optimistic expectations. Shipping, it is expected, will commence in a fortnight, when the snow has fallen sufficiently to allow hauling over it. Already there has been 50 tons come out this season over the roads but it became so muddy that no more has been brought out that way. Two caterpillar tractors are now on the way to Stewart and they will be used on the snow this winter in bringing out the ore for shipment. Besides these, sleds will also be used.

Water Power.

In about a month's time the water power plant at the Premier will be in operation and larger compressors will be used, thus allowing for more extensive development in the mine. The cyanide mill, Mr. Guess says, will be completed and running next spring and then only the highest grade values will be shipped out and no dross will have to be taken away from the mine.

Bert E. Smith has been removed from Hazelton to Stewart where he will be assistant to Dale S. Pitt, the manager at the Premier.

PATTULLO ADDRESSES LIBERAL GATHERING

and if each had got as much for his constituency as had been given for this, an immense sum would have had to be found. It was not customary to spend money in organized municipalities.

City Grants.

This city got from \$60,000 to \$80,000 for the government wharf, \$60,000 for the school, \$7,500 for the float for the 4-sh-boats at Cow Bay, there was a grant of \$60,000 for a road on the Islands, \$30,000 for a road to Lakeise Lake, in all about \$750,000 in the district. These expenditures were justified by the natural resources of the district which it was necessary to develop but would not be justified on a basis of population.

Mr. Pattullo said that some supporters of the Government had not understood these things and even some close personal friends were not fully informed. He had been here since the beginning of the city and he cited instances of the various times he had stood in the public interest in this city against the very people who were now opposing him. He said he did not like referring to these past things but they were being used and he wanted his supporters to be familiar with the situation. He urged the necessity of having an adequate water power for this city and said he had again and again taken this matter up with people who were interested but so far without success. It was a vital question.

Not Personal Interest.

Mr. Pattullo said he defied any man in British Columbia to show that he had ever put personal interest before public duty. He did not claim that all the good things that had come had been due to him but to co-ordinated effort. He had been a member of the delegation that brought the shipbuilding here. He had gone to Ottawa in regard to the fisheries. He believed the present Government was the best British Columbia had ever had and had passed more useful legislation, both social and developmental, than any former administration. He did not like talking of these things but he did not want personal prejudice to jeopardize the Government at this time.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

EXHIBIT OF SILVER FOXES

Ranch-Bred Animals to Compete for Prizes at Montreal this Month

An unique exhibition under the immediate management of the Commission of Conservation of Canada will be held in Montreal on November 24, 25 and 26. It will be the first international exhibition of ranch-bred five silver foxes. Fur-farming is rapidly becoming a scientific branch of animal husbandry and, although little more than a decade old, is one of Canada's most flourishing infant industries.

While the greater number of Canadian fox ranchers are to be found in the Maritime Provinces and chiefly in Prince Edward Island, there are many in each of the other provinces and the number is steadily increasing. The interest evinced in Quebec, Ontario and Western Canada generally demonstrates that many Canadians are desirous of embarking in the fur-farming and other fur-bearing.

Present advice indicates that fully 150 animals will be brought from Prince Edward Island alone. It is confidently expected that other provinces will send an equally large number in proportion to the number of their fur-farmers and many enquiries have been received from the United States.

A healthy growth of the industry should do much to check the rapid depletion of wild fur-bearing animals and to steady unstable conditions in the large fur markets. It is confidently expected that the exhibition at Montreal will result in the formation of a Fur Breeders' Association of Canada, which can do much to establish and keep accurate breeding records of pedigree fox stock and, in general, advance the interests of the industry.
