The robbery was noticed first this morning when Mr. McNulty arrived at his store and found the shelves in disorder, boxes opened up and articles, that the thieves had not taken, strewn about the place. On examination it was found that entry had been forced through the back door.



DENY STEAMER COMING HERE

Vancouver Office Says Capt. Logan Has Placing of Vessel.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 6 .- The G. T. P. offices today deny the story that the Prince Rupert will be drydocked in the north. It was explained here that the yard will be decided on by Capt. W. H. Logan, representative of the London Salvage Association, who is in charge of the salvage work, when the ship is floated.

Seen in regard to the above, Col. Peck showed the telegrams that had passed in connection with the matter. He had wied to the underwriters and received this reply: "Waiting Logan's report respecting docking Prince Rupert. Suggest you apply owners."

He then wired D. B. Hanna in regard to the matter and received a reassuring reply.
