LONDON, Nov. 3 .- The Handley Page Company have received information from their correspond- . ents that the North German Lloyd Company has succeeded in forming a "combine" of the leading aviation companies in Germany, Austria and Denmark.

The companies interested include the Albatross, of Berlin, the Badische Luftverkehr, of Baden, the Bavarian Rumpler Werke, of Augsburg and Berlin, the Hanoverian Waggonfabrik, Wollere, of Dessau, Lloyd Luftdienst, of Bremen, the Sablatnig, of Berlin, and the Viennese Flugverkehrs-Gesellschaft, of Vienna.

The German combine owns number of commercial aeropianes with saloon accomodation, capable of carrying from four to eight passengers and mails. Electrically heated foot-warmers have been fitted for the comfort of travellers during the winter

The service between Vienna and

Berlin is via Nuremburg and Munich. The German aviation companies are not permitted, at present, to fly over Czecho-Slovakia, but many communications have been decided upon in order to link up Northern Germany with Switzerland, Austria and Constantinople, and also with a view to communicating with the International Air Lines in the West The rate by' the new "combine" for passengers between Vienna and Berlin is 2,500 marks single, at the present rate of exchange present for a first-class railway ticket single, including sleepingcar charges. The time taken by the railway is 26 hours, as comtpared with the four hours 50 minlutes by the new air route. Italy also to be included in the service from Vienna to Milan, a distance of 385 miles, with a flying time of four hours 20 minutes.

Achievement

An important amendment to the Marriage Act, placing the mother on equality with the father in the matter of consent to the marriage of a minor child.

Liberal Administration

has revised and improved educational laws and regulations, giving better opportunities to children in isolated districts to secure an education. Its Health Department has given valuable assistance in the training of rural nurses. It has provided for venereal disease control. It has broadened the course in manual training, domestic science night schools and agricultural teaching. It has provided schools for mentally deficient children, the deaf and dumb. It has established a school for the education of the blind, and a provincial technical school. . It has provided for financing the erection of buildings for the University of British Columbia. Its Health Department has given special attention to the work of fighting tuberculosis. . The death rate from this disease has dropped from 1.23 per thousand of population in 1917-18 to .82 in 1919-20.

The Oliver Government has more beneficial social and domestic legislation to its credit than has any or all previous governments of British Columbia, and its efforts in this direction will be continued.
