OVERFLOW MEETING AT VANCOUVER LAST NIGHT

PATTULLO, FORMBY, NEWTON AND BURROUGH IN LINEUP FOR LEGISLATURE

Great Enthusiasm at Liberal Rally in Vancouver Last Night


In spite of Dense Fog Two Halls Scarcely Sufficed to Hold Crowds who Flocked to Hear Premier and Candidates

VANCOUVER, November 10.—Premier Oliver, M. A. Macdonald, Hon. W. J. deB. Farris, Mrs. Ralph Smith, Ian Mackenzie, Ald. James Ramsay and J. P. Dougherty addressed a big meeting and overflow here last night. Thousands crowded into the Dominion Theatre and O'Brien Hall in spite of the dense fog that made transportation difficult. The enthusiasm displayed has seldom been excelled in this city and never during the present campaign.

Premier Oliver spoke of the record of the Government. He admitted that there were deficiencies, for the Government was human, but he urged that they had unquestionably made such progress as to warrant their re-election, and apparently the big audience thought the same, for they cheered him again and again. Premier John has seldom received such an ovation.

The Premier went into some detail in regard to the legislation passed by the administration and emphasized particularly the Mothers' Pensions provision, which had been put through in a few months after a promise to do so was made, whereas the Conservatives had made promises which for fourteen years had been unkept.

WAR VETERANS INCREASE THE RELIEF FUND

Their Association has Set Aside \$4,000 and Appealing to the Soldiers' Aid Commission

TRADES AND LABOR AND MUNICIPAL AID

At a special emergency meeting of the Great War Veterans' Association held last evening it was decided to place \$4,000 in a fund to assist in paying off veteran workers at the dock who are in distress as a result of the tie-up. Col. McDermie, local representative of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, was present and he suggested that this body be appealed to for assistance. This action is being taken and a wire will be sent to Victoria today. In the meantime checks are being held out of the \$4,000.

At the Trades and Labor Council it was decided to send a wire to Attorney General Farris inquiring if it was in the power of the workers to hire the uncompleted ships in the yard. A committee from the council is interviewing the mayor this afternoon with a view to obtaining relief from the funds of the municipality.

BEAVER SKINS CONFISCATED

Action of Provincial Game Agents At Hazelton Upheld by Court of Appeal.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 10.—The action of the provincial game agents in seizing 70 beaver skins from James Kramer at Hazelton in February was upheld by the British Columbia Court of Appeal. The court allowed the appeal by the Crown against the judgment of Mr. Justice Murphy who had quashed the decision of the magistrates. The court held that the seizure was regular under the provincial game laws.

NOT CANDIDATE

W. R. Ross Still at Large after Declining Fernie Nomination

VANCOUVER, Nov. 9.—W. R. Ross, former member for Prince George, is still without a nomination to the Legislature, having again declined the Conservative candidacy at Fernie. The investigation is to commence November 15.


FISH COMPANY CLOSES PLANT

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Premier David Lloyd George in a speech here last night said that the crazy creeds of the Reds were hopeless in offering any solution to the present world unrest. The clouds that have shrouded world politics and world relations are, however, clearing.

The prime minister stated that the British Government had the Irish murder question by the throat now. The present outrages may soon cease.

ROYAL REPAIRING DAMAGE SUSTAINED IN TUG COLLISION

VANCOUVER, Nov. 10.—The Princess Royal leaves tonight on her regular schedule for Prince Rupert and intermediate ports. Today her starboard bow deck rails are being repaired after having been torn off by a slight collision in the fog with the Coastwise Steamship and Barge Co.'s tug Marion on her last trip north.

JAMES McNICHOLL DIES AT MONTREAL

Father of G. A. McNicholl Passes Away Before His Son Arrives.

POLICE HAD BUSY MONTH

Police Commissioner Myhill-Jones Says Force is Now Working Satisfactorily.

According to the report of the chief of police received by the police commission at the regular monthly meeting last evening there was \$3,372 collected in fines by the police department in the month of October. This establishes a high record mark for the amount of fines collected in one single month.

There were 81 cases brought up in the police court and 77 convictions were obtained. There were 46 drunks and 9 charges under the Prohibition Act. In several drug cases the maximum penalties were inflicted and in two cases the offenders had received both jail sentences and fines. There was one case under the Inland Revenue Act for having a liquor mash in possession. Bread and coal weights were reported fair. There were a number of small robberies and suspects were now in view. The conduct of the near beer bars was orderly.

"If the size of the docket is any criterion," said the mayor, "the public should be convinced that the police department is doing its duty."

During the course of the commission meeting, Commissioner Myhill-Jones stated that the police force, in his opinion, was working better now than ever it had since he had been a police commissioner. He would like to see two morality men on the force.

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AIMED AT CEILING AND SHOT GIRL IN THE FOOT DOING SO

VANCOUVER, Nov. 10.—While attempting to stop a noisy party Harry Gibb, a janitor, allegedly shot Clara Magnusson, a roomer, in the foot. He told the police that he had aimed at the ceiling.
