TRADES AND LABOR PRESIDENT SPEAKS ON WAGE REDUCTION

TORONTO, November 11.—Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, in an interview here, said that reduction of wages in the factories throughout the Dominion would defeat the object which the employers making reductions had in view. "The manufacturers of this country," Mr. Moore said, "depend primarily on their home markets, and any policy which curtails that market by reducing the purchasing power through a reduction of wages of the great mass of workers must be bad business."

Contending that a reduction of prices, which brought with it a reduction of wages, would only accentuate the situation instead of bringing relief, Mr. Moore said: "What is needed is a squeezing out of some of the margin which exists between the actual cost of production and the selling price of the finished product. The people of Canada are not concerned in the reduction of prices to that of any particular period. What is necessary is a re-establishment of the purchasing power and value of every dollar they receive as wages."

President Moore stated that while there had been some slackening off in the industries in the Dominion, general conditions were not as bad as many people imagined.

BY-LAW NO. 358.

A BY-LAW TO SHORTEN THE HOURS UPON WHICH THE VARIOUS RETAIL BUSINESSES HEREINAFTER MENTIONED MAY BE CARRIED ON.

WHEREAS a petition has been presented to the Municipal Council of the city of Prince Rupert praying for the passing of this by-law.

AND WHEREAS it has been proven to the satisfaction of the City Council that the said petition is signed by not less than three-fourths in number of the occupiers of shops in the City of Prince Rupert in which the after mentioned retail businesses are carried on; and also that the petitioners number in each class of business not less than three-fourths of the persons carrying on each such class.

AND WHEREAS the classes of shops referred to in said petition are:—Hardware, Electricians, Stationery, Drygoods, Clothiers, Butchers, Grocers, Bazaars, Furniture, Paint, Millinery, and Boot Shops.

AND WHEREAS it is advisable to repeal all Early Closing By-laws heretofore passed dealing with the various classes of businesses as hereinbefore set forth, and to re-enact the provisions of the said By-laws, where the said provisions are not repugnant to the prayer of the hereinbefore mentioned petition, said By-laws being numbered 261, 262, 263, 314 and 215.

NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—

After the coming into force of this by-law all shops in which any of the classes of business hereinbefore mentioned are carried on, shall be closed at the following time, namely:—

(a) On ordinary weekdays, namely, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday 6:00 o'clock p.m.

(b) Saturdays 10:00 o'clock p.m.

(c) Days prior to Public holidays, 10 o'clock p.m.

(d) Ten (10) days prior to Christmas Day all shops of the classes of business hereinbefore mentioned may remain open so long as desired.

(e) Each night during the week in each year in which the Annual Assemblage of the Northern B.C. Agricultural and Industrial Association is held, 10:00 o'clock p.m.

2. Nothing in this by-law contained shall be deemed to allow any of the occupiers of the classes of shops hereinbefore mentioned to keep their places of business open contrary to the provisions of the "Weekly Half Holiday" Act.

3. Any person breaking this by-law by keeping his shop open after the hours allowed by this by-law shall be liable to a fine of not more than Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for each day, and in default in payment of such fine, to imprisonment not exceeding (30) days.

4. This by-law shall come into force on the twentieth day of November A. D. 1920, and before that date the by-law shall be published by inserting the same in one issue of two newspapers published in the City of Prince Rupert.

Kergin is Favorite in Race for Representation of Northern Constituency

ANYOX, Nov. 11.—There are five candidates in the running here, two of those mentioned as possible starters having dropped out. Those whose nominations were formally filed yesterday are H. F. Kergin of Alice Arm, George B. Casey of Prince Rupert, O. B. Bush of Stewart, Patrick Daly of Stewart, and William C. Ross of Stewart.

The favorite and the most likely winner is Mr. Kergin. He is so well and favorably known everywhere that his election is looked as a sure thing. He was a little late starting his campaign, but his committee is very enthusiastic.

Non-Resident

Mr. Casey is well-known at Alice Arm and Stewart, but he is a non-resident and will not get much support, except from the members of the O.B.U. and some of them will go for Pat Daly.

Mr. Daly gets a good reception at the meetings, but he will not get the votes. People do not take him seriously. He is well liked, but the people do not think he would be just the sort of representative they should send to Victoria.

Bush a Promoter

Mr. Bush has been a company promoter too long to inspire confidence among legitimate mining men. There is a feeling that he tried to stampede the Liberals into accepting him as their candidate, but the Liberals will vote for Kergin and Bush will to look elsewhere for his support.

Mr. Ross, as the straight Conservative candidate, is making a strong appeal, but in his case there is the knowledge that he will be a supporter of Mr. Bowser and, with the Oliver Government returned, as it is sure to be, the people want a man who is in a position to help them.

The Far North

The people of Atlin Lake district have not been heard from, except in a short wire which says they know Kergin and will give him a majority. Neither candidate will be able to visit that district without neglecting the southern voters.

FOGS RESPONSIBLE FOR SHIP'S DELAY

Prince George Arrived Last Night
In Command of Captain
Moorehouse.

Fogs held up the steamer Prince George so that she did not arrive last night until about ten o'clock. She came in charge of Captain Moorehouse who took her over at Beaver Cove from Capt. Nedden.

Fogs held up the steamer just after she left Vancouver and again near Millbank Sound. So thick was the weather at times that there was nothing to do but wait until it lifted. These fogs have been prevalent all along the coast and especially at Vancouver.

At Beaver Cove the Prince John was making a call southbound when the George passed north and Capt. Moorehouse left his ship in a launch to exchange with Capt. Nedden who had brought the vessel north to that point.

G. T. ARBITRATION

Time Allowed to Prepare Case for
Adjudication

MONTREAL, Nov. 11.—At a meeting today of the board of arbitration, which is to assess the physical value of the property of the Grand Trunk railway and fix the value of its stock in connection with the nationalization of the system, it was decided unanimously to allow the representatives of the Grand Trunk such time as they might need in order to prepare their case for final adjudication. It was decided by the arbitration board to fix February 1 next for the formal opening of the proceedings, which will take place at Montreal.
