### We Are Judged by Our Public Men.

The people on the outside judge Prince Rupert by her public men. For several years the place has been represented at Victoria by Hon. T. D. Pattullo and as a result the impression has gone abroad that this city is one with men of big calibre. It is not saying anything disparaging of the other candidates to say that for this reason it would be a good thing to continue the representation at Victoria.

Mr. Pattullo is a minister of the crown. He does not rise in the House and make wild speeches which get him nowhere. He uses his quiet influence, not to get us more than our share of good things but to see that the city and district are both fairly treated, and that they get all that is coming to them. He has done this in the past and he will do so in the future.

Pattullo is a man with a big vision. He sees this province in capital letters and he sees this district in red type. This is his city and while it is necessary for him to live in the south while he is minister of lands, his heart is here, his interests are here, and he is always in close touch with his constituents.

Is there anything wanted at Ottawa? At once the cry is woe. Pattullo and get his support and perhaps get him to go east and use his influence direct. Pattullo has personality. He has influence beyond the walls of his office. When he speaks, people listen. That is the sort of man we want to represent us. We do not want a man who will play peanut politics.

### Pattullo and Oliver Are First Rate Team.

Pattullo and Oliver make a first rate team. Oliver is the farmer whom Mr. Bowser admits is smarter than a lawyer. He has during his many years of public life won the confidence of the people and they are going to return him again to power. That is generally conceded. It is not party talk to say that Bowser cannot win at this election. It is so generally known that even the supporters of the extremely honorable Bowser admit it. The Conservatives are fighting to knit their party and get ready for the big fight four years hence. No one knows that better than Mr. Bowser.

Suppose Mr. Pattullo were defeated and the north lost her representation in the provincial cabinet. Then we should kick ourselves every day for the next four years to think we had done such a foolish thing.

We do not think the people of Prince Rupert are intending to defeat Pattullo. They have more sense than that. However, elections are so uncertain that it is always good to reason the matter out and make sure that the proper course is being taken.

### Quick Action for Soldier Pay Checks.

Quick action for the soldiers who want their pay checks cashed was secured yesterday from the finance minister. The minister of lands and Col. McMordie both wired the Returned Soldiers' Commission asking for some money for the purpose. Promptly the finance minister was authorized to allot \$5,000 and the wire was received yesterday saying the money was available. This with the splendid work the War Veterans have done along similar lines makes it possible for many to get their money without having to pay a scalper's fees.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
