MEMORIAL TO FALLEN HEROES

Service at Presbyterian Hall in
Honour of the Great
Sacrifices.

PROPOSES NEW CHURCH BE IN THEIR MEMORY

There was a memorial service last night at the Presbyterian Church hall in commemoration of the sacrifices of the sixteen men of the congregation who fell in the war overseas and of the 150 men who went to fight. In the course of his sermon the pastor, Rev. Dr. Grant, suggested that when they build the new church in the near future it should be known as the Memorial Church and in it should be a tablet to those who served their country.

Before the sermon the whole congregation stood while the names of the sixteen men were read and continued to stand while Miss Edmunds played the Funeral March. The names were:

Lieut. R. Stalker, Lieut. James Russell, Pte. J. A. Macdonald, Pte. Neil Keith, Pte. John Haggie, Pte. James Stewart, Pte. James Watt, Pte. Neil MacKay, Pte. Charles Dennis, Pte. Roy McKinnon, Pte. John McKenzie, Pte. Andrew Brighton, Pte. Frank McVittie, Pte. Harry Hunter, Pte. John McLeod, Pte. Wm. Donald.

Dr. Grant alluded in his address to the tendency to forget and urged on his congregation that they should not fail to remember the sacrifices that had been made for us. He also urged the need of better provision for the widows, especially those with children, and for those who were handicapped as a result of having fought for us. In a rich land like this he said there was no reason why all should not be well provided for. France was caring for her immense legacy of widows and orphans and if they could do surely we should not be backward. It would be a standing disgrace if any boys or girls were handicapped in the battle of life because their fathers did their duty.

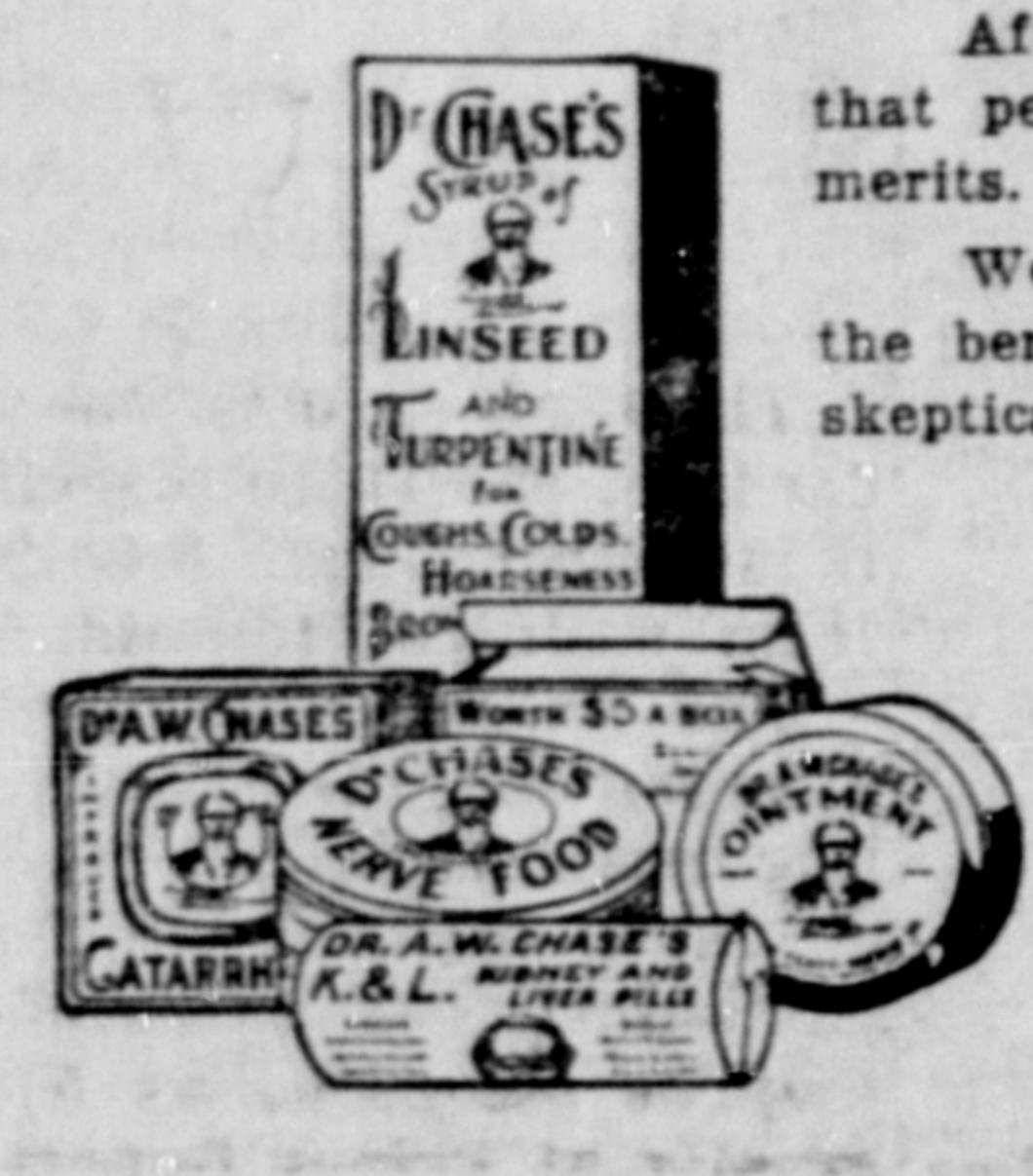
