**Stand by Guns and

Some of our friends have asked why the Daily News takes sides to such an extent in this election. Why do we not give the other side a chance? Our reply is that we give every side a say through our columns, but that we are so enthused with the desirability of returning Pattullo as the local representative that we cannot miss any opportunity of trying to advance his cause, as long as it is done in a fair and square manner.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.
