What Has Pattullo Done for Prince Rupert?

On the first page of this paper Saturday was an article which aims to answer the question, "What has Pattullo done for Prince Rupert?" It is worth studying. It may not be couched in the language of the parliamentarian, but it is expressive. There is, however, something that seems to have been forgotten in the article. His effort in trying to secure a hydro-electric power for the city and plenty of it was defeated, largely on political grounds, and the same people who have placed the city in the helpless position in which she finds herself today in regard to power, are now opposing the return of Mr. Pattullo. Many of them have changed their minds because they realize what it would have meant to the city to have had a big hydro-electric plant selling power to big manufacturing plants, right at our doors. Mr. Pattullo is still working on this power problem and if he gets another term in the Legislature he will likely land it.

Big Four for Northern B. C.

Citizens of the north are keenly interested in the north. They want to see it go ahead. What helps one part of the north, helps another. The north is a unit. What we want to do now is to send a solid four members to Victoria, who will work as a unit for the north. They must not be at cross purposes one with the other or nothing will be done. We want a good many things. Unified effort will get them.

Let Pattullo Finish His Work.

"Let Pattullo finish his work." That is a good slogan. It is a slogan that appeals to people who see the necessity of carrying on the good work that has only just commenced. For two years after the government came into power the war was on. For another year at least the reconstruction work was in hand. Now the finances have been restored, the big problems connected with the work are well in hand, and a period of expansion is ahead. Let Pattullo finish his work in this district.

Terrace Will Give Pattullo Majority.

After all the stories that had come to town in regard to the political position at Terrace, the minister got by far the best reception of any candidate there, when he spoke on Saturday night. There was a large crowd out and it was found that there is a large and enthusiastic group of supporters of the present Government at that point. It was estimated by one Terrace man, who was in a position to know, that at least half of the Terrace people would vote for Pattullo, the remainder being divided between the other three, with Formby and Burrough running close for second place. Newton does not seem to have much of a following at Terrace.

The whole outlook for the constituency is good. There is a strong Liberal organization at Ocean Falls and also a large percentage of support at that point for the Liberal candidate. Reports from other parts of the province all indicate that the Oliver Government is sure to be returned.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
