### In the Letter Box

**ANOTHER TRIBUTE.**

Editor Daily News:—  
I have just finished reading the very beautiful tribute to the Hon. T. D. Pattullo published in your issue of November 27.

While treachery may be the one, treachery and base ingratitude are the two unpardonable sins of the world.

There is a snatch of song in such an article and I, for one, thank you very much for having written it.

We are as truly influenced today as the ancients ever were with picture writing, and it does not require a very plastic imagination to see Duff Pattullo as you, in your article, have painted him.

**Ignored False Things.**

In offering my comments to you I do not, in the slightest, consider them educative—for I do not question the intelligence of the reading public; but the time is pregnant and your remarks have opened up a range of thought which might not occur to them until their eyes fell upon your editorial.

During his incumbency of office, the News has more or less ignored the false things sent broadcast by his political enemies and when you have noticed them at all it has been with gloves—what could you expect but to be startled at and bitten to the bone?

The time has come when deliberate and malicious lies are too contemptible to go unpunished, even though we must sometimes reluctantly temper by adding—by implication—the most dangerous of them all.

**On the Trail.**

Stop and think, men and women, no one knows the man, Pattullo, like those who met him on the trail and under adverse circumstances. I became acquainted with him at Bennett in '98 and have personally known him to do inexpressively tender things for his fellow men and animals—generous to a fault and thoroughly honest.

And later, when he plucked the job he now holds from the grills he had a red hot hickory nut to crack—a period when war and flurried finance made the country tremble—and you have kindly shown us in your article how passing well he carried on.

To further their political desires there are some good men who say Pattullo is ambitious—that Pattullo is too cocksure.

What would you think of a man who has no confidence in his own ability, or a man who did not hope, and wish and believe that he could crawl out of the darkness into the sunlight—that he could never hope to climb the stairway that leads from the abyss to heaven? If it be true, all hail to such ambition! Did Pattullo ever utter a promise and then fail to put every fibre of his being into an effort to accomplish—and at a time too in the annals of his country when the very elements of civilization were against him?

**TERRACE HAS GREAT FUTURE**

Road to be Built to Lakelse Lake and Bridge Across the Skeena River.

The new proprietor of the Lakelse Lake hot springs is at Terrace arranging for the sending of the sawmill into the lake within a few days in order that the hotel may be built in the spring. He took up with the minister of lands the proposal to build a new road to the lake, and this will be done at once. The route will be shortened considerably and will conform to the position of the new bridge which is to be built.

Another project in which Terrace people are interested is the road to Kitsumkalum Lake. This will be one of the Provincial Government works to be given attention very soon.

With a daily train service, Terrace should prove to be a very important centre with all sorts of possibilities.

**FISH BOATS HAD ROUGH TIME IN THE BIG STORM**

Seven refrigerator cars available at the waterfront are to be used up with the fish sold at the Fish Exchange this morning. Prices are remaining quite low on account of the decreased demand from the east.

Boats coming in yesterday and today reported hard going in Saturday's gale. It was one of the worst blows for a long time and the smaller boats with large cargoes were all awash.

Adeline, 4,200 pounds, and Tordenskjold, 45,000 pounds, sold to the Booth Canadian Fisheries at 14.5c and 6c.

Myrtle, 2,000 pounds; Carolen, 44,000 pounds, and Venus, 35,000 pounds, sold to the Pacific Sea Products Association at 10.9c and 6c.

Tillicum, 34,000 pounds, and Daisy, 20,000 pounds, sold to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. at 14c and 6c.

Tatoosh, 48,000 pounds; Ingrid H., 3,000 pounds, and Hippo, 3,000 pounds, sold to the Pacific Fisheries at 14.9c and 7c.
