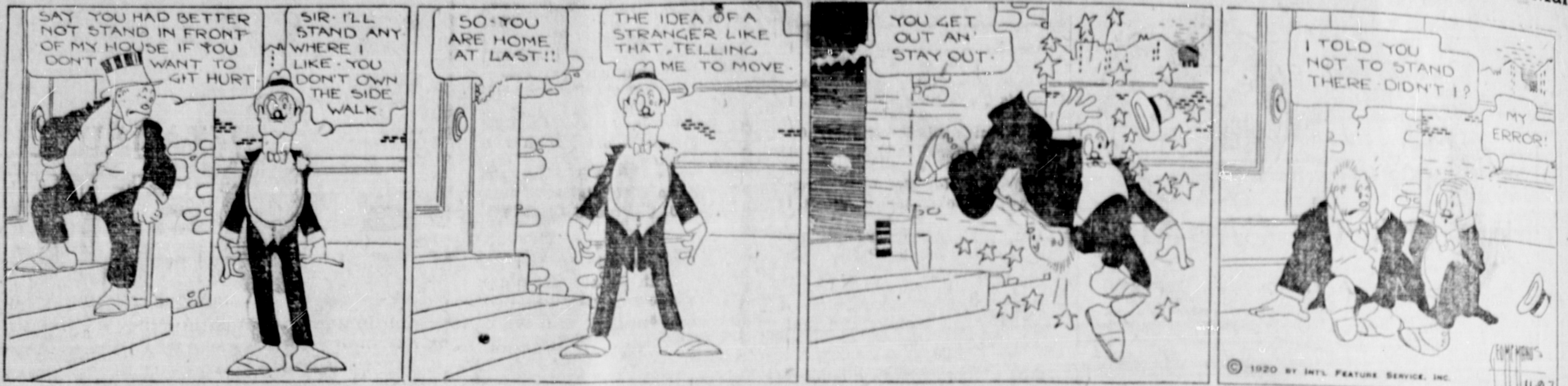

The entire new legislature at Victoria which will soon take office as a result of last Wednesday's election comprises many professions and trades and is made up of nine lawyers, four farmers, four doctors, four merchants, three insurance agents, three contractors, three real estate men, two miners, two clergymen, two civil engineers and one each printer, publisher, retired gentleman, lumberman, mariner, druggist, dentist, lady member, manufacturer and financier.

The following give brief biographies of the Conservative, Labor and Independent side of parliament:

CONSERVATIVES

Vancouver
 W. J. Bowser, the veteran leader of the Conservative party, belongs to the prominent firm of lawyers, Bowser, Reid & Wallbridge. He was premier for a few months before the Brewster government was elected in 1916.

Kaslo
 Col. Fred. Lister, of Camp Lister, also goes under the United Farmer banner. He farms in Kaslo district.

Victoria

Rev. Canon Joshua Hinchcliffe, Anglican, was formerly padre of the B.C. Bantams.

Dewdney

John A. Catherwood, member-elect, is a general broker in Mission City. He is extensively interested in fruit lands in the Fraser Valley.

Esquimalt

Robert H. Pooley, of the Pooley, Luxton & Pooley law firm of Victoria, is re-elected to the seat

Lillooet

Archibald McDonald, of Clinton, is re-elected. He is a retired gentleman and is also secretary of the Clinton School Board.

Nelson

Dr. W. O. Rose, of Rose & Hartin, Nelson physicians, enters upon his third term as member for Nelson, which is perennially Conservative.

Richmond

Thomas Pearson, Reeve of Point Grey, succeeds G. C. McGeer, Liberal, as member for Richmond. He is a well-known business man.

Rosland

William K. Esling, financial and insurance agent of Rosland, is a new man in the legislature. He succeeds W. D. Willson, Liberal, who did not seek re-election.

Similkameen

William A. McKenzie, the ranch contractor from Penticton, was given a close run by E. J. Chambers, the Liberal farmer.

Slocan

William Hunter, of Silverton, is a lumberman and mine owner and a director of the Silver Standard. He was a member the session before last and gave Charles Nelson, Liberal, a close run at the 1916 election.

South Okanagan

James W. Jones, the Kelowna merchant, enters upon his second term as member for this constituency.

Trail

Next to W. J. Bowser, J. H. Schofield, of Trail, has the longest consecutive term as member for a district, having been first elected as member for Ymir in 1907. Mr. Schofield is an insurance man.

Ymir

John McRae, reeve of Kent district, is an Agassiz contractor. This is his first term in the legislature.

INDEPENDENT

Aiberni

Major Richard J. Burde, publisher of the Port Alberni News, is entering upon his second term, after a close contest with Brig. Gen. N. E. Money, the Soldier-Farmer.

Comox

Rev. Thomas Menzies, for many years Presbyterian minister at Sandwick, was the successful candidate with a strong combination, farmer, labor and People's party behind him in a district with a badly split up vote.

Cowichan

Kenneth F. Duncan, a returned officer and an old timer in Duncan, He was formerly mayor of Duncan and his father established the town. He is a member of the real estate firm, Mutter & Duncan.

North Vancouver

Captain George S. Hanes, re-elected as member for North Vancouver, bolted from the Liberal party over the P.G.E. policy. He served overseas and is a civil engineer, formerly North Vancouver city engineer.

LABOR

Fernie

Thomas Uphill, the Fernie labor member, is an insurance agent from the city of Fernie.

Newcastle

Samuel Guthrie is a North Oyster miner. This is his first term and he succeeds J. H. Hawthorthwaite, Socialist, whom he defeated.

South Vancouver

Robert H. Neelands, a printer, succeeds J. W. Weart, who retired as member for this riding.

The Rev. Josephus Epreham Smith, distant relative of the other Smith—you know—is being brought to Rupert at great expense by the Elks. Be sure and hear him at the Westholme December 7th.
