SCOTIA'S SONS AT HALIFAX IN FESTIVE MOOD

Annual Dinner was Important
Event; Formerly Lasted Three
Days

HALIFAX, N.S., Dec. 4.—One hundred and fifty-two years ago the North British Society of Halifax sat down to its first St. Andrew's dinner. Last week the inheritors of that Society, one of the most ancient Scottish organizations in Canada, sat down to a like festive board, only they did not sit so long. In the days when John Gillespie, first Moderator of the Society and his immediate successors presided at the St. Andrew's dinner the members assembled at three o'clock in the afternoon and the merrymaking sometimes, they say, lasted for three days. However, these were the brave old times when the toast list was as long as one's arm.

Scots were always valiant trenchermen, but the business of the North British as it grew up with Halifax town and became one of the institutions of Nova Scotia, was not that of supplying eatables, not to mention drinkables, to its members. The Society first concerned itself with the welfare of Scotia's sons and many a Scottish immigrant has blessed its name.

Many Great Members

Playing a very large and altogether genial role in the history of the old garrison city of the blueses, the North British numbered among its members the finest Haligonians, men distinguished in all pursuits from the laying of bricks to the occupying the chair of the Chief Justice of the Province. Among a long line of distinguished presidents appear the names of Chief Justice Thomas Halliburton (Sam Slick), Chief Justice Sir William Young, Col. James Bremner, Col. C. J. Macdonald, Hon. Robert Sedgewick, Dr. Allan Pollok, Dr. John Forrest and Premier George H. Murray.

Since its inception in Halifax in 1768 the North British through weps and the piping times of peace has carried on its charitable work, and exerted through its individual members and as a cor-

porate body not a little influence on Halifax and Nova Scotia.

At the dinner this year Alvin F.

Macdonald, editor of the Morning Chronicle and the new President which has become an event among of the North British, had the blueses.

COLLISION ENQUIRY HAS BEEN CONCLUDED

Indication that Marmion-Princess
Royal Collision will be Declared
Unavoidable Accident

VANCOUVER, Dec. 4.—The inquiry into the Princess Royal and the Marmion collision is ended and judgment will be handed down in due course. Wreck Commissioner McPherson is anxious that no certificates will be lifted, but the evidence will be weighed to see if blame should be attached to either ship. The indication is that the court will take the view that the occurrence was an unavoidable accident.

BIG LUMBER BOOM

RESTIGOUCHE, N.B., Dec. 4.—Work on the timber booms of the Restigouche has ceased for the season. A large amount of timber, estimated at fifteen million feet in the South boom and twenty million feet in the North boom, has been held over until next year. The lumber business for the winter does not look very promising and there are indications that the cut will be less than normal.
