Greek People Want Constantine Back

NEW FISH PACKING HOUSE TO BE BUILT AT ONCE ON GOVERNMENT WHARF

Battle Between Creditors is Proceeding at Vancouver

Dispute as to the Appointment of Official Receiver is matter for difference of opinion in Supreme Court Chambers

VANCOUVER, Dec. 6.—In Supreme Court chambers this morning a tussle started between Vancouver and Prince Rupert creditors for the appointment of a receiver for the Prince Rupert Dock and Engineering Co.

R. S. DAY DIES AT VICTORIA

Prominent Business Man of the Capital Succumbs as Result of Accident.

VICTORIA, Dec. 6.—R. S. Day, over thirty years prominent in the business life of the city, died here yesterday, as the result of an accident nine days ago when he fell down the area at the Empress Hotel.

STREET CAR JUMPED TRACK

Many Injured at Montreal, Some Fatally, Yesterday as Result.

MONTREAL, Dec. 6.—Twenty-five persons were injured, some fatally, when a train car travelling down Maplewood Avenue on Sunday, jumped the rails and struck a telephone pole and split in two.

MANY AUTOMOBILES IN PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

EDMONTON, Dec. 6.—A record has been made this year in the number of auto licenses issued by the Government. The total number this year for Alberta is 38,050 as against 34,000 last year. The increase of over 4,000 is considered to be an indication of increased prosperity, especially among the farmers of the province.

PROPOSE TO MAKE PEACE IN IRELAND BEFORE CHRISTMAS

DUBLIN, Dec. 6.—Rev. Michael O'Mahagan, acting president of the Sinn Fein organization, has sent a telegram to Premier Lloyd George worded as follows: "You state you are willing to make peace without waiting for Christmas. Ireland also is willing. What steps do you propose?"

LABOR SITUATION IS NOT VERY GOOD

Many More Applications Than Jobs at Provincial Bureau During November.

During the month of November there were 226 applications for jobs at the Provincial Labor Bureau but only 96 of these were filled. Owing to the closing up of so much work in the district during the month, this condition was brought about. Practically all the logging camps, some of the mines, the Hutton mills and cranby have discharged men and only the 4c camps and the Premier mine have taken on any.

REFUSE MONEY

Banks Will Not Advance Any More to City of Edmonton.

EDMONTON, Dec. 6.—The bank has refused to advance any more money to the city, the overdraft of which is already approximately \$200,000. The money for the payment of school expenses for November is not forthcoming. Only sixty per cent of the city taxes for the year have been paid, and this is considered unsatisfactory by the financial institutions.

DOHERTY AND PEACE TREATY

Sir George Foster Makes Statement in Regard to Canada's Attitude.

GENEVA, Dec. 6.—"Canada's act on has no relation whatever to the attitude of any other nation toward article 10 of the League covenant," said Sir George Foster, head of the Canadian delegation, today, regarding Hon. C. J. Doherty's amendment to the covenant that article 10 be eliminated.

FURTHER RETURNS MAKE LEAD LONGER IN FAVOR OF LIBERALS

Straggling election returns in Junieca and Prince Rupert ridings further swell the majorities to the credit of Alex. M. Manson and Hon. T. D. Pattullo. In this district one vote now separates Formby from Burrough for third place honor, the one being in favor of the labor man.

Murder of Austrian is Suspected at Nanaimo

Body was found on track badly mutilated with blood stained pocket knife near by and money gone

NANAIMO, December 6.—Early Sunday morning the body of an Austrian, William Choyich, was found on the railway track under circumstances that the police state points to murder.

Fish Packing House to Be Erected on Wharf by Provincial Government

Tenders are being called by the provincial government for the erection of a double fish packing plant on the new extension to the government wharf which is about completed. The new building will be a two-storey structure 56 feet long with a frontage of 120 feet on the waterfront. It will be roofed with a five-ply tar and gravel roofing. The tenders are to be in by December 10 and it is expected that the building will be finished and ready for occupation by the end of January.

EXPLOSION AT NEW YORK

Lighter Loaded With Shells Took Fire, Burning Dock and Vessel.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—A lighter loaded with shells caught fire at Fort Hamilton dock, Brooklyn, on Sunday and a series of explosions followed. The dock caught fire and the burning vessel was towed into narrows.

Greek People Vote Monarch's Return

Result of Plebiscite is overwhelmingly in favor of Constantine again becoming King of Country

ATHENS, December 6.—The Greek plebiscite shows that the people of that country have given an overwhelming majority in favor of the return of the former King Constantine to the throne.

DISPOSAL OF RESOURCES

Canadian Representatives Oppose Intervention From Other Countries—Switzerland in Favor.

GENEVA, Dec. 6.—The question whether countries shall be allowed to control and dispose at will of their natural resources is the subject of a sharp conflict in a committee of the Assembly. The contest arose over a resolution by Gustav Ador, Switzerland, setting up a permanent Economic and Financial Commission, one of the duties of which would be to examine measures for preventing monopolies in raw materials and the means of controlling their distribution.
