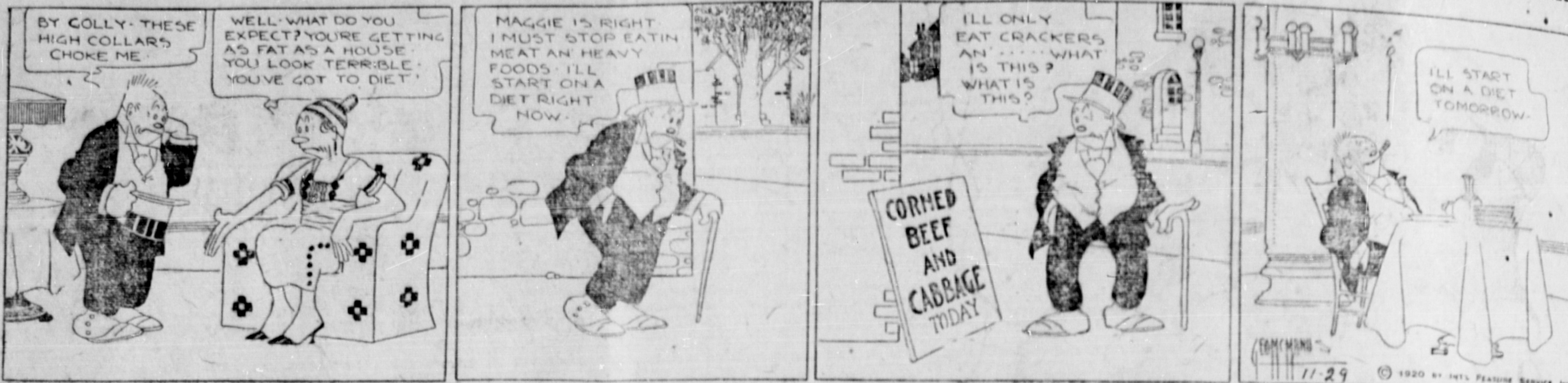

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BOLSHEVISTS HOLD MEETING IN ALBERT HALL

Revolutionary Talk by Leaders of Rebellious Movement in Great Britain.

A demonstration, organized by the National Friends of Russia Committee and the Communist Party of Great Britain to celebrate the third anniversary of the Russian Soviet Republic was held in the Albert Hall on Sunday, when resolutions were passed congratulating the Soviet Government, protesting against the present policy of the British Government towards Russia, and calling upon the National "Council of Action" to send an ultimatum to the Government declaring that, unless the Government raised the blockade, abstained from all interference in Russian affairs, established full trading relations, and recognized the Soviet Government by a specified date, the Council of Action should call for a national "down tools" policy.

Mr. C. L. Malone, M. P., who was one of the principal speakers, attacked "the Thomases and the Braces" for their action during the miners' strike.

Armistice Silence.

After some interruption, Mr. Malone went on to say that next Thursday his Majesty (hisses) was calling a general strike of the country in order to commemorate the victory of one set of Imperialists over another—a victory which had given no advantage or relief to any of the working classes of any land, but which had caused misery to millions of men, women and children. It had brought advantage only to a mere handful of profiteers and place seekers. If they were to have a general strike let them not exploit the dead to advertise the man who boasted that he had won the war. (Cheers)

Social Revolution.

Mr. Malone spoke against a number of leading members of the Government and remarked that Sir Basil Thomson, who was the figurehead at the top of the British Okhrana, and had tried unsuccessfully to incriminate him last week, would like him to say, "Prepare for the mobilization of the Red whatnots!" but there was no need to tell the people to prepare, for every Communist thinker knew that before the capitalist class demobilized their interests constitutionally, they would resort to unconstitutional action. He urged them to leave no stone unturned in preparing for social revolution. The day was not far distant, he hoped, when they would meet in the Albert Hall to bless the British revolution. (Cheers). When that day came, "Woe to those people who get in our way." They were out to change the present constitution, he declared, and if it was neces-

ATTACKED BY EAGLE

Attempt of Big Bird to Carry Off Child is Frustrated

GLENDON, Wyo., Dec. 6.—It took the combined efforts of the Spalding family today to save eight-year-old Walter Spalding from being carried away by a gigantic eagle at their ranch near here.

When the huge bird attacked Walter in the ranch yard he grasped it by the neck and screamed for help. John, his seven-year-old brother, came to the rescue and a third boy ran for help. Mrs. Spalding beat off the bird with a stick and the eagle attacked her. She was saved when Mr. Spalding came with a shotgun and despatched the bird. It had a spread of eight feet.

The two boys were severely lacerated by the eagle's claws.
