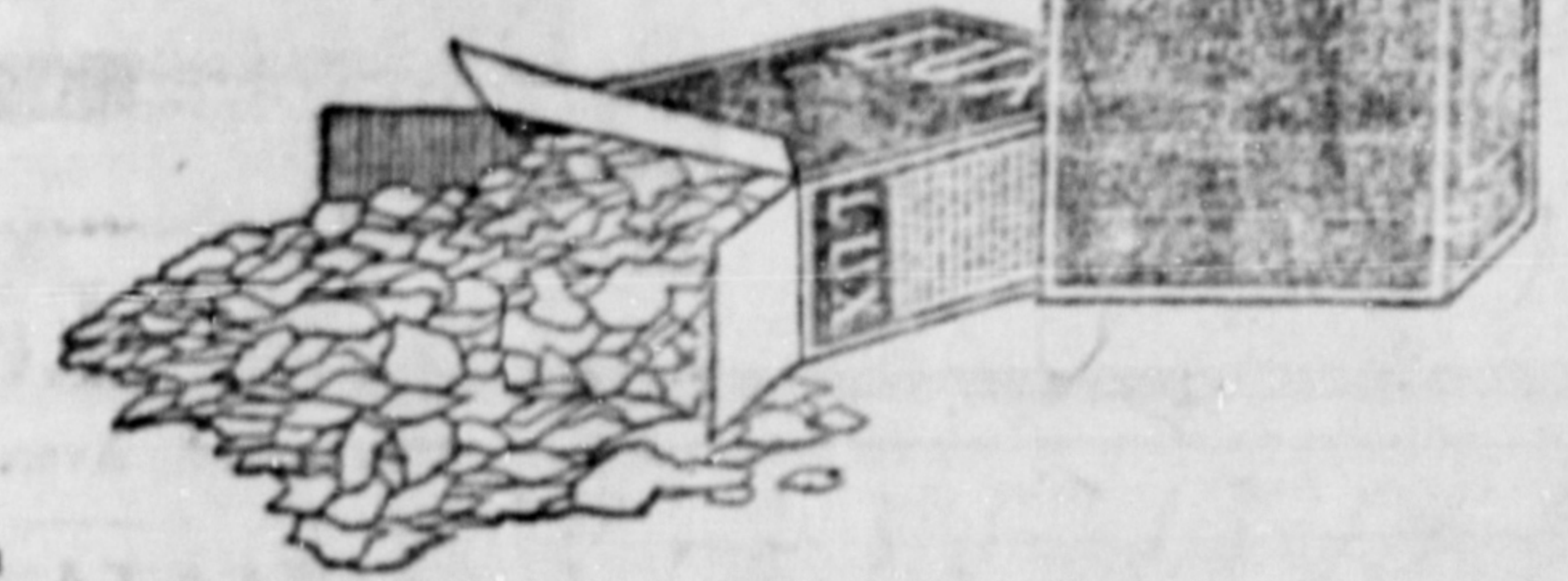
Silk and colored curtains---and LUX

INTERNATIONAL YACHTING RACE

Contest Probably at Cowes Next Year; Several Entries Each Side

LONDON, Dec. 6.—Sir Charles C. Allom, the Rear-Commodore of the Royal London Yacht Club, has received a challenge from the United States for a new international yacht race. The contest will probably take place in Cowes Week next year.

The challenge comes from four American yachtsmen, all well known in yachting circles on the other side of the Atlantic—E. W. Stewart and Paul Hammond, New York; Guy Lowell, Boston; and Paul Drexel, Philadelphia. On this side of the Atlantic it will be handled by a committee consisting of representatives of the four leading organizations that have headquarters on the Solent—the Royal Yacht Squadron and Royal Thames, Royal Victoria and Royal London Yacht Clubs. Already a number of meetings have been held, at which Sir Charles C. Allom has represented the Royal London, W. P. Burton the Royal Victoria Yacht Club, and Captain J. G. Orr, secretary, the Royal Thames Yacht Club; and certain details have been arranged. We understand that the Royal Yacht Squadron will be represented at future meetings.

Briefly stated, it is proposed that the races shall take place in British and American waters in alternate years, and that the boats shall be of the new international 6 metre class, several of which are being at present built on the Clyde for well-known Scottish yachtsmen. There will be three or four competitors on each side, so that the race will be a team one and not an event confined simply to two vessels, as is the case with the America Cup.

MELODRAMA TONIGHT AT THE WESTHOLME

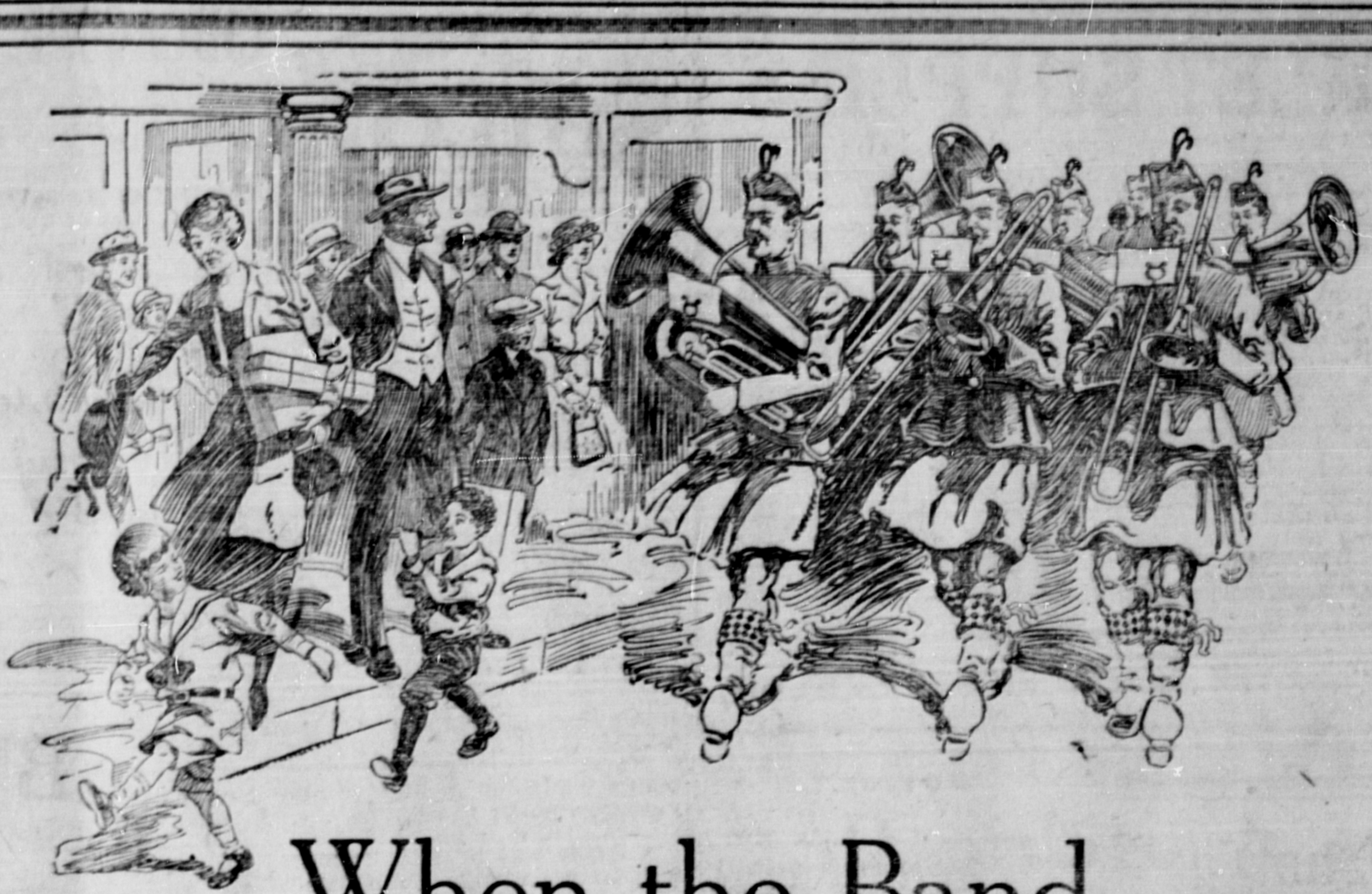

PIGMY OWL

Small Carnivorous Bird Found With Sparrow in Its Claws Yesterday.
