MOVE TO AVERT HASTY WEDDINGS

Anglican Social Service Council
Would Have a Week's
Notice Given.

TORONTO, Dec. 8.—A resolu-
tion was passed at a meeting of
the executive of the Anglican
Council of Social Service calling
for legislation for the prevention
of hasty marriages. The resolu-
tion was as follows:

"We deem it advisable to seek
legislation making it legally
necessary for those wishing to
marry in Canada to give public
notice thereof for at least a week
before the ceremony."

Canon C. W. Vernon, general
secretary of the council, stated
that the object of the resolution
was to eliminate hasty and ill-
considered marriages, which of-
ten lead to divorce and matri-
monial unhappiness.

"We have not thought out the
details of what the public notice
should be, but certainly it ought
to be announced in the nearest
newspaper and perhaps posted up
in the community," said Canon
Vernon.

"We also advocate that there
should be only one issuer of
licenses in each municipality, and
by one who is not interested in
the commission. He would be
paid a salary, and it would dignify
the position if all licenses were
issued in Toronto at the city hall
by one official."

After bringing the matter be-
fore all other churches and social
service councils it will be placed
in concrete form before the Pro-
vincial Governments.

Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

December 8, 1910

The City Engineer is preparing
to make the deep fill on First
Avenue between Seventh and
Ninth Streets. A dry stone cul-
vert is being provided for the
creek to pass through and provision
is also being made for the
passage through the wall of the
sewer and water mains.

Close by the Phoenix Theatre a
spacious new frame building is
being erected by George S. Leet,
Alfred Jendron and William Tal-
bot. Downstairs will be a res-
taurant and upstairs apartments.

Fifteen thousand people at-
tended a protest meeting in To-
ronto last night, and then rushed
out on the streets wrecking cars
and injuring people, over the
newly installed pay-as-you-enter
car system. The police stood by
powerless to cope with the mobs.

The local Masonic Lodge has
offered to furnish a ward in the
new hospital. Yesterday a de-
putation from the lodge consist-
ing of A. J. Morris and D. R.
Morrison made the offer to a
meeting of the Board at which
were present President J. A.
Kirkpatrick, D. G. Stewart, P. I.
Palmer, H. H. Clarke, William
Manson, M.P.P., Ald. Pattullo and
A. Guthbert.

On account of the frost, bal-
lasting has stopped on railway
construction work, but bridge
building still goes on. The steel
has now reached Mile 102.
