

## EMBARGO STILL ON CANADIAN STORE CATTLE

**Matter is Discussed by London Newspaper With View to Removal.**

LONDON, Dec. 13.—What is the mystery surrounding the refusal of Lord Lee of Fareham, the Minister of Agriculture, to support the removal of the embargo on the importation of Canadian store cattle to England? asks the Daily Express.

Mr. Prothero (now Lord Ernle) said in April, 1917: "I can assure you that as far as the English Board of Agriculture is concerned we are in favor of the removal of the embargo."

Lord Lee has not only failed to fulfill the promise given by his predecessor. He has definitely stated that, in his judgment, the arguments put forward in favor of removing "the existing safeguards" are far outweighed by the gravity of the objections which would be urged against such a course.

**Astonished at Ignorance.** The Hon. Manning Doherty, Minister of Agriculture in Ontario who is at present on a visit to this country, expressed himself astonished at the ignorance which Lord Lee's argument exhibited, adds the Express.

"When Lord Lee," said Mr. Doherty, "remarks that the statement that Canadian store cattle could be imported economically in competition with the home article, is open to considerable doubt, he is at complete variance with the facts."

Farmers here are paying 100 per cent more for steers than the corresponding class of cattle fetches in Canada—first because the supply is limited in this country, and, second, because of the comparative absence of pasture facilities.

The extensive areas of pasture in Canada and the cheaper land enable us to breed our cattle far more cheaply than can be done in England.

### Result of Embargo.

"What is the result of the embargo? The store cattle so badly needed in England and Scotland are eagerly snapped up by the United States, and the British consumer receives them in the shape of canned meat. The English people, instead of buying cattle on the hoof from us at a cheap rate, purchase the same animals, canned from the United States, and pay two profits, Canadian and American.

"We welcome the British statesmen who come to Canada and deliver speeches about the bonds of Empire. Let them forge material bonds; let them open their markets to our cattle and other produce; let them look ahead and cut out trade channels within the Empire."
