The steamer Princess Adelaide arrived from the Old Country at Vancouver this morning.

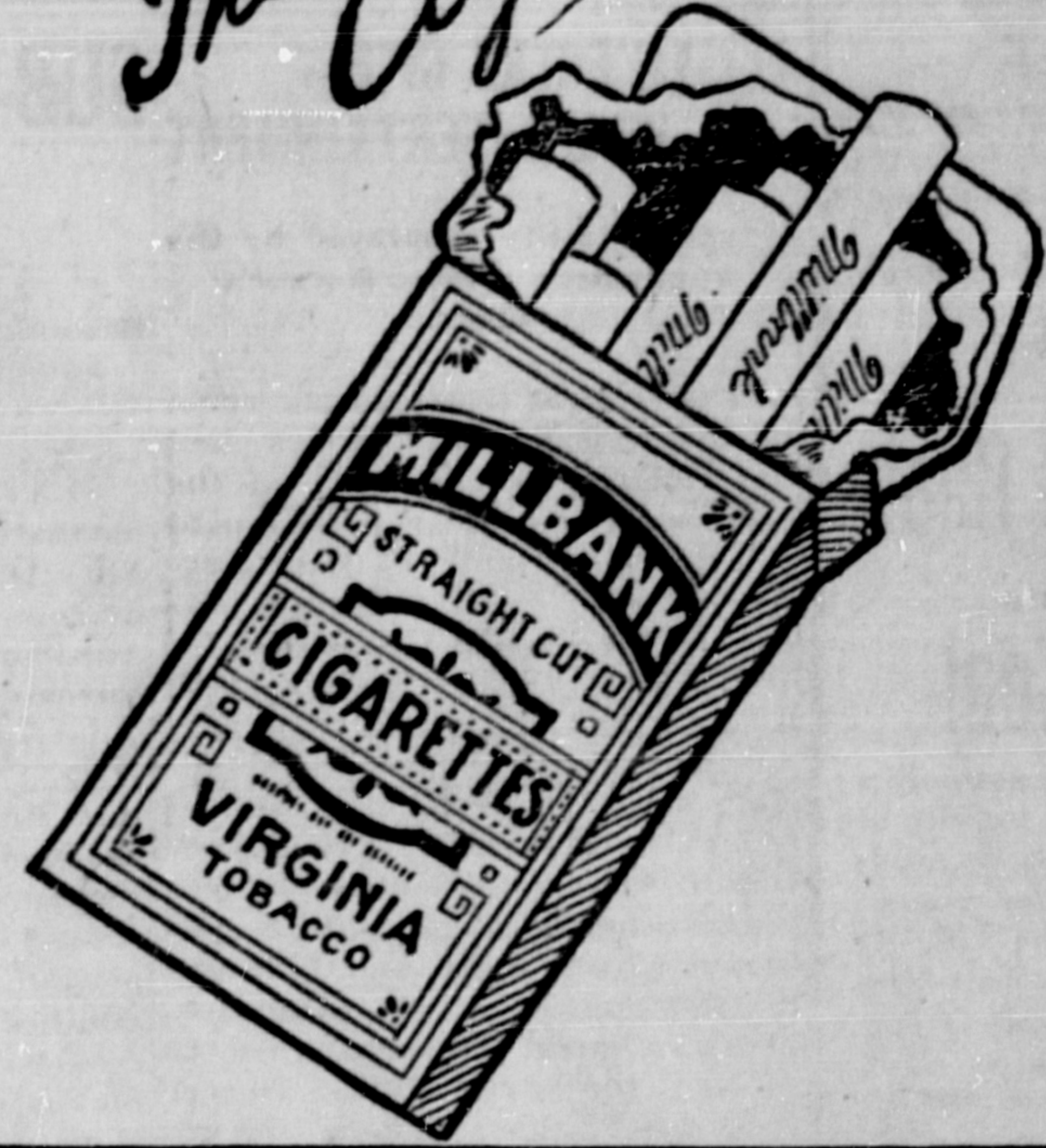
