G. W. Nickerson In the Field.

G. W. Nickerson is a candidate for mayor. After much persuasion he has decided to allow his name to go before the electorate. He is a busy man and it means considerable sacrifice to give up his time from his business in order to devote it to the service of the city.

There has been a good deal of demand from certain quarters for a young man who is not touched with any of the old ideas and who is enthusiastic and energetic. We have that in Mr. Nickerson. He is a man who has not sought the office, but who has, to some extent, had the nomination thrust upon him.

Should Test Candidates On Power Question.

One of the questions which all mayoralty candidates should be asked would be their attitude on the power question. Supposing there should be a proposal to have a big concern come in and start a power project, what stand will be taken in regard to the matter.

As an ideal municipal ownership of our power production would be the correct thing. As a matter of practical politics and with the desire to see the city grow and expand and develop industries, it would seem as if it would be very much to the advantage of the people here to have large capital interested in the district.

Pulp and Power Will Go Together.

Pulp and power are likely to go together in this district. We want pulp mills and we want power for other purposes. If we can get a pulp mill, say at Port Essington, and a power plant that will deliver power here at commercial rates so that big industries coming in may depend upon a plentiful supply all the time and not be threatened with being cut off, as has already happened with some of our industries, then we may expect to expand.

No Hope of Municipal Power.

There is no hope of the city undertaking a municipal power scheme for some time to come. We cannot afford it. The bond buyers will not advance the money. Without money nothing can be done. We need to use our money for roads, and sewers and water connections and lighting and all sorts of other improvements.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

MIDDLE COURSE CORRECT ONE, SAYS PREMIER

Farmer Leader of Ontario Speaks on Citizenship to Winnipeg Canadian Club.

In the course of a Canadian Club luncheon address at Winnipeg recently, Premier Drury said that there were two extreme schools of thought, one the individualistic, holding that man's individual activities should be as little interfered with as possible; the other, the Socialistic, which would increase the activities of the state to include all things. One school of thought is illustrated by those who hold the sacredness of "vested rights," even when these may be "vested wrongs;" the other illustrated by the speaker, which read: "It is the business of the state to feed, clothe and house the people."

"I agree with neither of these views," declared Mr. Drury. "The middle course is, so far as I see, the correct one."

"The British constitution, or more correctly, practice of government, is the most democratic system in the world. It has come through two distinct evolutions. First, the centuries-long struggle of the citizen against the crown, to have his rights defined and secured. This, while begun against an autocracy, must be maintained even against a democracy. The spirit of the Anglo-Saxon demands the maximum of individual liberty, compatible with justice between individuals. The first function of the state then, is to so rule that the rights of the humblest subject, even against the power of the whole democracy, are absolutely secured, while seeing to it that no subject or group of subjects may depress or defraud any other subject or group of subjects."

Public Ownership. "The second evolution of the state has come from the gradual extension of state-directed activities, extending from the postal system as a beginning to a score of public utilities. This movement is growing, and is bound to grow; how far is a question. My own conviction, having in mind the Anglo-Saxon temperament, is that it will stop very far short of state socialism. The ideals of the race involve the holding of private property, not far perhaps from the old words: 'They shall sit every man under his own vine and under his own fig tree, and none shall make them afraid.'"

Citizens' Duties Outlined. "The part of the citizen in wholesome development is all-important. Under our system, the citizen, collectively is king. But a king asleep on the job is useless. Our people have too often slept in the past. Nothing drastic is needed. The power of the people is absolute, but it must be exercised intelligently. Our citizens need, first, loyalty to our laws and governments as expressing the will of the people; second, alertness to see that governments and laws do in reality express the people's will; third, vigilance against unscrupulous politicians who too often have gained a following by seeking to stir up factional strife, and fourth, a broad public spirit which will be willing to make the same sacrifices for the public good in times of peace which are given so freely in times of war."
