G. W. Nickerson
In the Field.

G. W. Nickerson is a candidate for mayor. After much persuasion he has decided to allow his name to go before the electorate. He is a busy man and it means considerable sacrifice to give up his time from his business in order to devote it to the service of the city. He goes into the field with a clean record and with a large section of the community behind him. Under these circumstances he is likely to be elected.

There has been a good deal of demand from certain quarters for a young man who is not touched with any of the old ideas and who is enthusiastic and energetic. We have that in Mr. Nickerson. He is a man who has not sought the office, but who has, to some extent, had the nomination thrust upon him. He has risen to the occasion and has decided to assume the obligations of the candidature and if successful should prove a strong mayor.

Should Test Candidates
On Power Question.

One of the questions which all mayoralty candidates should be asked would be their attitude on the power question. Supposing there should be a proposal to have a big concern come in and start a power project, what stand will be taken in regard to the matter. It is possible there will be no opportunity to do anything, but on the other hand there may be such an opportunity.

As an ideal municipal ownership of our power production would be the correct thing. As a matter of practical politics and with the desire to see the city grow and expand and develop industries, it would seem as if it would be very much to the advantage of the people here to have large capital interested in the district. If such a thing had happened years ago, we should undoubtedly have been a prosperous community with double our present population.

Pulp and Power
Will Go Together.

Pulp and power are likely to go together in this district. We want pulp mills and we want power for other purposes. If we can get a pulp mill, say at Port Essington, and a power plant that will deliver power here at commercial rates so that big industries coming in may depend upon a plentiful supply all the time and not be threatened with being cut off, as has already happened with some of our industries, then we may expect to expand. A pulp mill running regularly all the year round at Essington or Port Edward would be a great thing for Prince Rupert. Plenty of power for other projects would also be a good thing. With industries like that at the mouth of the Skeena there would be no difficulty in getting a road built out of this city to connect with that area. One industry brings others. We have to fight hard for our early industries, but later they come themselves. Expansion is important and for that reason the mayoralty candidates should be asked to make their position clear. No camouflage should be accepted.

No Hope of
Municipal Power.

There is no hope of the city undertaking a municipal power scheme for some time to come. We cannot afford it. The bond buyers will not advance the money. Without money nothing can be done. We need to use our money for roads, and sewers and water connections and lighting and all sorts of other improvements. These we must have and to care for them is our first duty. The result is that we cannot possibly hope to generate power in commercial quantities. We may, however, get someone to develop the power projects for us and we as a city shall then reap the benefit which comes from increased industries, increased population, growing civic importance and political prestige.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 percent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
