## OFFICERS FOR NEW SOCIETY

Association Formed at Victoria to  
Combat Venereal Disease.

Another step forward in the campaign for the suppression and eradication of venereal diseases in British Columbia was taken at a meeting held in the Provincial Library, when the organization of the Vancouver Island Council of the Provincial Committee for Combating Venereal Diseases was proceeded with, a constitution adopted and officers and committees named to carry on the work until the first annual meeting in November next year, says a Victoria paper.

Dr. H. E. Young, Provincial Medical Health Officer spoke briefly outlining the organization steps proposed as a result of recent discussions at a meeting held at Vancouver. The idea is to form a Mainland Council and a Vancouver Island Council, with local councils at various points in the interior. The work of the councils would be in great measure in bringing before the public of the problem and securing public support to the campaign against disease. The Provincial Committee, it had been suggested at Vancouver, would consist of six members from Vancouver and a like number from Vancouver Island, of which latter number Victoria might supply three members. He emphasized the fact that the organization would be purely voluntary, stating that the Government, while not desiring to be affiliated with it, could be counted on to give it all the advice and support necessary.

The Presbyterian and Methodist Churches Have Christmas Music, Decorations and Addresses.

## WATER NOTICE. USE AND STORAGE.

C., will apply for a license to take and use one thousand second feet and to store five hundred second feet of water out of Lowe Inlet River, Lowe Inlet, B. C., also known as Verney Falls, which flows westerly and drains into Lowe Inlet about at its head. The storage dam will be located at (1) Lowe Inlet, (2) Upper Lake, (3) Simpson Lake. The capacity of the reservoir to be created is about 250,000 acre feet and it will flood about 4,000 acres of land. The water will be diverted from the stream at a point about at the head of Lowe Inlet and will be used for power purpose upon the land described as KUM-O-WA-DAN Indian Reserve No. 3 and crown lands. This notice was posted on the ground on the 23rd day of November, 1920. A copy of this notice and an application pursuant thereto and to the "Water Act, 1914," will be filed in the office of the Water Recorder at Prince Rupert. Objections to the application may be filed with the said Water Recorder or with the Comptroller of Water Rights, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B.
