EDMONTON PEOPLE CHANGE LOCATIONS

After January 1 Many Business Houses will be Moved.

EDMONTON, Dec. 29.—With the first of the year, there will be a number of changes in business locations in this city. The Standard Bank which has had its offices since its establishment in the city on the corner of Jasper Avenue and 102nd Street is taking the offices in the McLeod Building which have been occupied by the firm of Allan, Killam and McKay, Alberta, Ltd. The latter firm has made arrangements to move to the Quebec Bank block and will occupy the offices recently vacated by the Edmonton, Dunvegan Railway. They expect to take over these new offices early in the new year, and to be all settled by the 15th.

The corner at the McLeod building will be considerably changed with the removal of the Allan, Killam and McKay company and also the De Hart Art company as arrangements have already been made for the Board of Trade to occupy this location. The Standard Bank is not taking over its new offices till the first of March, but it is understood that some extensive alterations are being made for their occupancy.

The Princess Ena is now on her way down the coast with a million pounds of halibut from the New England Co. at Ketchikan, consigned for Vancouver.
