TOUCHING SCENES AT ABBEY TOMB

Fact that Soldier is Unknown Attaches Unusual Feeling

LONDON, Dec. 30.—Scores of touching incidents have been witnessed at the tomb of Britain's "Unknown Warrior" in Westminster Abbey as long lines of men, women and children have passed the black marble slab covering the grave.

The fact that no one knows the name of the man who lies beneath the slab leads many to offer tributes in the hope perhaps that the body is that of a missing son. The mother of one of the thousands of unknown warriors, any one of whom might be reposing in Westminster Abbey, laid three war medals, the Mons Star, the Victory Medal and the British War Medal on the grave as she passed in the line.

A soldier's modest offering of flowers bore the inscription: "In loving memory of my two pals and all the other pals." The epitaph placed on the slab reads: "For King and Country—Greater Love Hath No Man Than This."
