MANY NEW COMPANIES GAZETTED THIS WEEK

VICTORIA, Jan. 9.—Eleven new companies have been incorporated in the province of British Columbia this week, according to the official British Columbia Gazette. Among these are the Salmon River Mother Lode Mining Company, Ltd., with a capital of \$100,000, with their headquarters in Vancouver. Another is the Queen Charlotte Island Spruce Products, with a capital of \$300,000, whose head office is also in Vancouver.

A light and fog alarm is to be established on Barrett Rock, Prince Rupert Harbor, about March 1, 1920, when the gas and bell buoy will be removed. The light will be occulting red acetylene, automatically occulted at short intervals, elevation, 22 ft.; color, white, and height, 44 feet. The fog alarm will be a diaphone giving two blasts every 30 seconds, thus, blast, 2 secs.; silent interval, 3 secs.; blast, 2 secs.; silent interval, 23 secs. It will be controlled by a submarine cable from a dwelling on shore east of the fog signal.
