Canada and the Inter-Church Forward Movement.

There has never been much enthusiasm among Canadians for half measures or for half and half men. The most frequent criticism of our educational system is that it exalts mediocrity and hampers the development of genius in any branch of knowledge or of art. In business life intensive effort has won public approval and the chief cause of complaint made against the "failures" is that they did not make the full use of the facilities lying to their hand.

The establishment of the two great railway systems in the Dominion was due to the desire of Canadians to do a big job as well as possible. Our people are eager and alert to make good. They supported the war in the same way as they work—with nervous intensity and without regard of the cost. And they take their pleasures in the same manner. For that reason, now that the Churches have agreed on a common policy, this Forward Movement is likely to succeed. The desire for success is noted in the psychology of the nation. The very spaciousness of the plan is of the sort to appeal to the Canadian people. The Church leaders are giving proof to the various denominations that the need of a broader programme is insistent. They have shown courage and determination. They are likely to see the desire of their eyes.

Railway Development

A Big Factor.

D. B. Hanna, president of the Canadian National Railways, foresees a bright future for the publicly owned lines. With the inclusion of the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific, the people of Canada will own more than fifty per cent of the mileage of the country's railways. With the C. P. R. in competition, the National Railways have no mean competitor and the comparative returns and costs of the two systems will be scrutinised carefully. The Government has at present under consideration the building of several 15,000-ton steamships to connect with their ocean terminals, and with the final ratification of the agreement between the government of Canada and the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, it is probable that the construction of the ocean docks at Prince Rupert will be gone on with. Prince Rupert is the port which will rival Vancouver. The saving in time on traffic with the Orient compared with Vancouver is the great factor which will compel the National Railway Board to develop this port at the soonest possible moment. Besides which, all other things being equal, the people and merchants of Canada will route their shipments over their own road rather than with the competing company. It will pay them.

The War Stimulated Personal Saving.

Great Britain has not yet finished taking stock of the gains and losses caused to the Empire through the war. The greatest loss was in killed and disabled, and after that in shipping. The latest Admiralty report shows that 2,479 ships of a tonnage of 7,59,000 gross, were sunk. To partly compensate for this loss, however, one of the remarkable things has been the tremendous increase in the deposits of the savings banks. These have more than doubled. This does not take into consideration either the vast sums of savings which are tucked away in war certificates and bonds. The lessons of thrift and economy impressed upon the nation under war conditions have not been lost. In June, 1914, the savings deposits in a group of the larger banks was £434,984,000, and in June, 1919, these had jumped to £1,503,717,000. The habit of constant and regular saving has become part of the British national life.


