EARTHQUAKE CAUSES GREAT RUIN IN MEXICO

Towns and Villages Virtually Destroyed and Thousands of People Killed.

MEXICO CITY, January 12.—Six hundred persons were killed at Barranca Grande, when that place was destroyed by the earthquake a week ago Saturday, according to a dispatch received here from Vera Cruz. Jalapa, the former capital of the state of Vera Cruz, and the town of Teocela were virtually ruined, while the village of Ayahualco was crushed and buried by great rocks which rolled down from the adjacent mountain. The same fate is reported to have befallen the village of Exhuacan. One small child is the only survivor of all the inhabitants of the village of Santito, in the state of Puebla, which was overwhelmed by poisonous gases.

At Barranca Nueva, the upheaval opened a great gap in the earth. One house containing several people dropped to the bottom of the fissure and the survivors above could hear the cries of those imprisoned below. Food has been lowered to the prisoners by ropes.

NEWS NOTES FROM THE QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

Logging operations are going on apace in the spruce camps of Graham Island. Mills are preparing for a record output during 1920. It is expected that there will be a phenomenal run of salmon when the fishermen and cannerymen will be busily engaged. Trappers have been very successful, one buyer purchased over three thousand dollars' worth of marten and land otter skins from the natives during a recent visit. The prospects for the islands appear bright and a large influx of mill hands, fishermen and pre-emptors is looked for.

The Massett Indians elected their Council for the ensuing year. Alfred Adams, Peter Hill, William Matthews, Adam Abrams, Robert Brown and Jasper Amos were elected. A returned soldier, Jasper Amos, was elected Chief Councillor. The Massett Indians work under by-laws and attend to the internal affairs of the towns in the same manner as the cities govern the municipalities.

At a basket social held on Massett Reserve, Queen Charlotte Islands, over four hundred dollars was raised to aid in the completion of the pretentious Anglican Church now under construction.

The Prince Albert brought a first consignment of canned crabs from the new cannery at Naden Harbor on Virage Sound. A number of men and women are employed in capturing and preserving the large crabs found beneath the waters of Naden Harbor where another industry has been added to the growing trade on the Queen Charlottes.

Christmas trees for the children has been the order of the day at Massett and Port Clements. Basket socials, masquerade balls and social gatherings were held under the auspices of the church societies and G. W. V. Society, which were well attended. The residents of Queen Charlotte Islands passed the holidays in a most pleasant manner.

Contractor Muse, after building a new wharf at Massett and repairing the wharf on the Indian reserve, is now engaged with a large crew building a wharf at Port Clements.

Three large "Killer" whales visited Massett Inlet and dispersed, to the wonder of the residents along the shores.

The marriage of James Jones to Mrs. Isaacs Wilson took place at Skidegate on New Year's Eve. The contracting parties were born on Graham Island and received the congratulations of the residents at a festival held in the Town Hall.

Five births, with no deaths, increased the population of the Queen Charlotte Islands during December.

On account of the mildness of the winter, game was not plentiful before the close of the shoot-

ing season. The absence of snow and ice, with the weather all that can be desired, again shows the climate of the Queen Charlottes cannot be surpassed in the Dominion.

Charles Adam, one of the oldest settlers, now resident in Prince Rupert, recently paid a visit to Graham Centre and Port Clements. A number of veterans met Comrade Adam and made his stay as pleasant as possible.

A practical joke was perpetrated on an amateur trapper a short time ago. A dead calf was placed in one of his steel-traps. The amateur trapper carried the carcass for some miles to his cabin and prepared the hide for the fur dealers, apparently imagining he had a marten skin worth over twenty dollars. The hide will not grace the shoulders of some Parisian beauty, much to the disappointment of the amateur sportsman.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted immediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to value of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown grants and

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heir or devisee of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person to five years from the year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
