

The plan seems to be to get a newspaper backing for the Hon. Car Shortage

Is General.

Speaking of the general shortage, Frank B. Carvell, chairman of the Railway Commission, said recently:

"The people of British Columbia have no idea how they are of the tax purchaser within 35 days from supplied with cars; that is to say, relatively speaking. In the Eastern Provinces the railways have to go on much shorter allowances of rolling stock. The fact is that between 21,000 and 22,-000 more Canadian cars are on the United States rails today than there are American cars on Canadian rails. At least one-tenth of the cars owned by Canadian railroads are locked up in the United States, and we are afraid to let more go there. It is one of the most serious problems before us.

"Canadian railways, as well as every other public utility in Canada, are suffering from the high cost of everything, just as you and I are. It is a pretty serious thing to order further service unless it can be proved that there is sufficient business to warrant it. Railways as a rule want to do business, and sometimes the public doesn't recognize what it costs to run a railway."


