Sport Briefs

Leading hockey authorities of
the United States met yesterday
in New York to decide upon ways
and means of sending a crack A-
merican hockey team to the Olym-
pic games in April. It is planned
to arrange a team chosen from the
amateur stars of Boston, Pitts-
burg, Philadelphia and New
York to contest for the world's
championship with fast aggrega-
tions which it is believed will
come from Switzerland, Scandi-
navia and even Canada. It is an-
ticipated that there will be sev-
eral try-out games in the East and
West of the United States for the
purpose of choosing players for
the Olympiad.

It would indeed be a difficult
matter to keep track of all the of-
fers that have been made to Jack
Kearns and Descamps for the ap-
pearance of their principals in
that much-spectulated-on world's
heavy-weight title match. It is
hard to say if the managers them-
selves remember all the offers
made. Judging from the number
of bids for the bout it should
prove one of the most popular and
largely attended fight ever held.
Descamps, manager for Carpen-
tier, says that he thinks the match
will be held in America and that
1,000 Frenchmen will cross the
pond to witness it.

Both managers seem to be very
confident of the outcome. Kearns
believes that Jack Dempsey is in-
vincible while Descamps says
that he cannot imagine Carpen-
tier being defeated. He says that
Dempsey has yet to meet a fight-
er of Carpentier's calibre—one
who is quick and a heavy hitter.
So far Dempsey has engaged only
with fighters of the heavy, slow
type. Descamps even goes so
far as to say that Carpentier may
clear up in four rounds. This,
however, seems a little far
fetched although, it may be sure,
that the battle will be for the
first knock-out as early as possi-
ble.

One of the latest offers is from
the movie king, William Fox. He
announced last week that he would
offer \$550,000 for the coming
battle. Under his conditions the
fight must be staged in the United
States and the purse be divided
