COMMITTEE TO DEAL WITH ORIENTAL LABOR

Trades and Labor Council Objects to Orientals Working on Wharves—White Men Out of Work.

At last night's meeting of the Trades and Labor Council a report was heard in the matter of the residence being built at Pacific Place with Oriental labor. George Waddell stated that he had seen Superintendent McCall who had informed him that the house was being built by District Engineer Featherstonehaugh and that the company had nothing to do with it other than having granted him the ground.

The question of the employment of Oriental labor at the docks was also taken up and a committee appointed to look into the matter. The council feels that, as there are returned soldiers and white men out of work here, they should be given a chance at this work before Orientals.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-irrigated.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Title cannot be obtained for less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted interim certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant has made improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption. If he requires land in conjunction with farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites of at least 2 acres may be purchased for \$500 per acre; conditions include payment of stampage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or assigns of deceased pre-emptors may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until the date of the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by holders on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1918.

Taxes are remitted for five years after date of recording of pre-emption, on provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase owing to forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original purchase, purchase price and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commission.

Annual grazing permits issued on established numbers raised; priority for purchase of land by stock-owners may foria Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers up to ten head.
