

## Big Dock Extension Modern Structure

Plans Have been Received from Winnipeg by Local Engineers; Expected That Work will Commence in Near Future

The plans for the new extension to the Grand Trunk Pacific docks were received in the office of the district engineer last Monday from/Winnipeg. These plans are of a very pretentious nature and the new wharf, which is to be used for salmon handling and the Oriental trade, will be one of the most up-todate and modern structures of its kind on the Pacific coast. It is the intention of the company to, have the new wharf ready for use this season and word of the final adoption of the plans and letting of the contract will probably be received in the near future. According to the plans, as received, the new extension will be 860 feet long and 173 feet wide.
