## Lloyd George Makes Notable Speech in British Commons

The Ferocity, Rapine and Cruelties of Bolshevism may Disappear Before Inroads of Commerce, British Premier Thinks.

## Warns Parliament Against Anarchy in Own Country

Period of Discontent and Dissatisfaction Inevitable Following Big War, But Government Determined To Persevere Law and Order in Ireland.

LONDON, February 11.—Lloyd George, William Adams and Donald Maclean in the House of Commons yesterday spoke for the Government, the Laborites and the other opposition representatives respectively. The Premier gave an explanation of the Government's Russian policy but refused to be drawn by other speakers on the topic of revising certain unworkable features of the peace treaty.

Dealing with the burning question of economy, the Premier commended a familiar species of increased production. His remarks on Ireland gave no new information regarding the measure which is soon to be introduced.

Mr. Sidney Peel, coalition minister, who spoke in reply to an address on the speech from the throne, said: "It will be a great disappointment to us if the United States finds itself unable to take part in the work of reconstruction. But she must be able to do so in her own house as well as in ours."

## SERIOUS EFFECT ON STATES COTTON TRADE

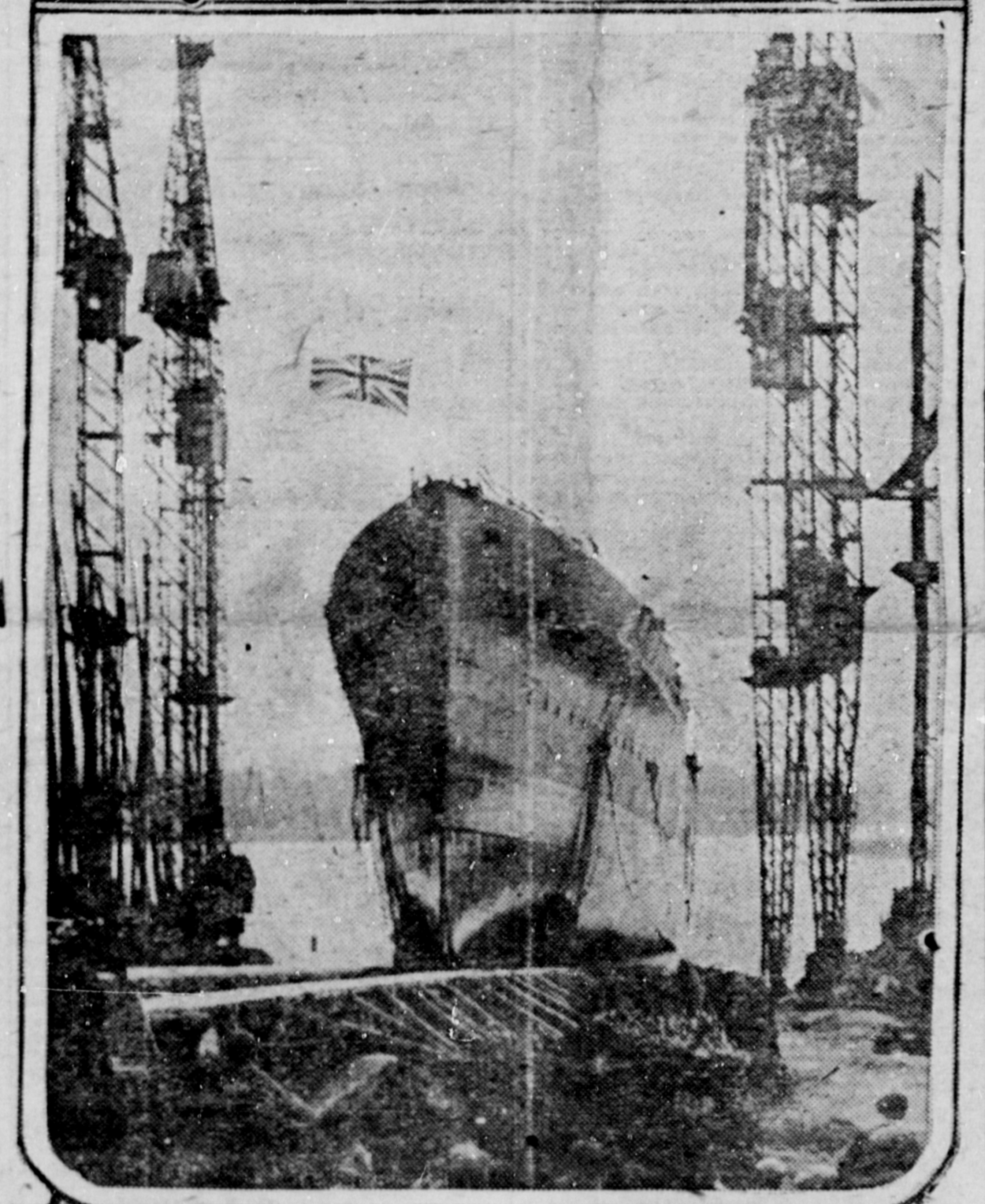
Britain is Greatest Market and Inability to Handle Import Causes Falling Off of Trade.

## RAILWAY STRIKE

## Old "Owl" Gambling House In Mexico City Destroyed Amid Greatest Excitement

MEXICO CITY, February 11.—Another landmark of the vanishing west met destruction last night when to the accompaniment of screams, shots and roaring flames the old Owl gambling house and its attendant structures were totally destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated to be in excess of \$250,000.

When the fire broke out more than 1,000 persons were crowded about the tables where gambling of every description was in full swing. Many exciting scenes occurred and a panic was narrowly avoided.

Guards stationed about the room added to the confusion when they fired upon several Mexicans who attempted to gather up money on the tables.

Efforts of the fire department were seriously hampered when some unidentified men cut the hose in two places, evidently for the purpose of giving the flames a chance to complete the work of destruction.

## EXTRADITION TANGLE

Suggested That League of Nations Make Demand and Refuse Admission if Not Complied With.

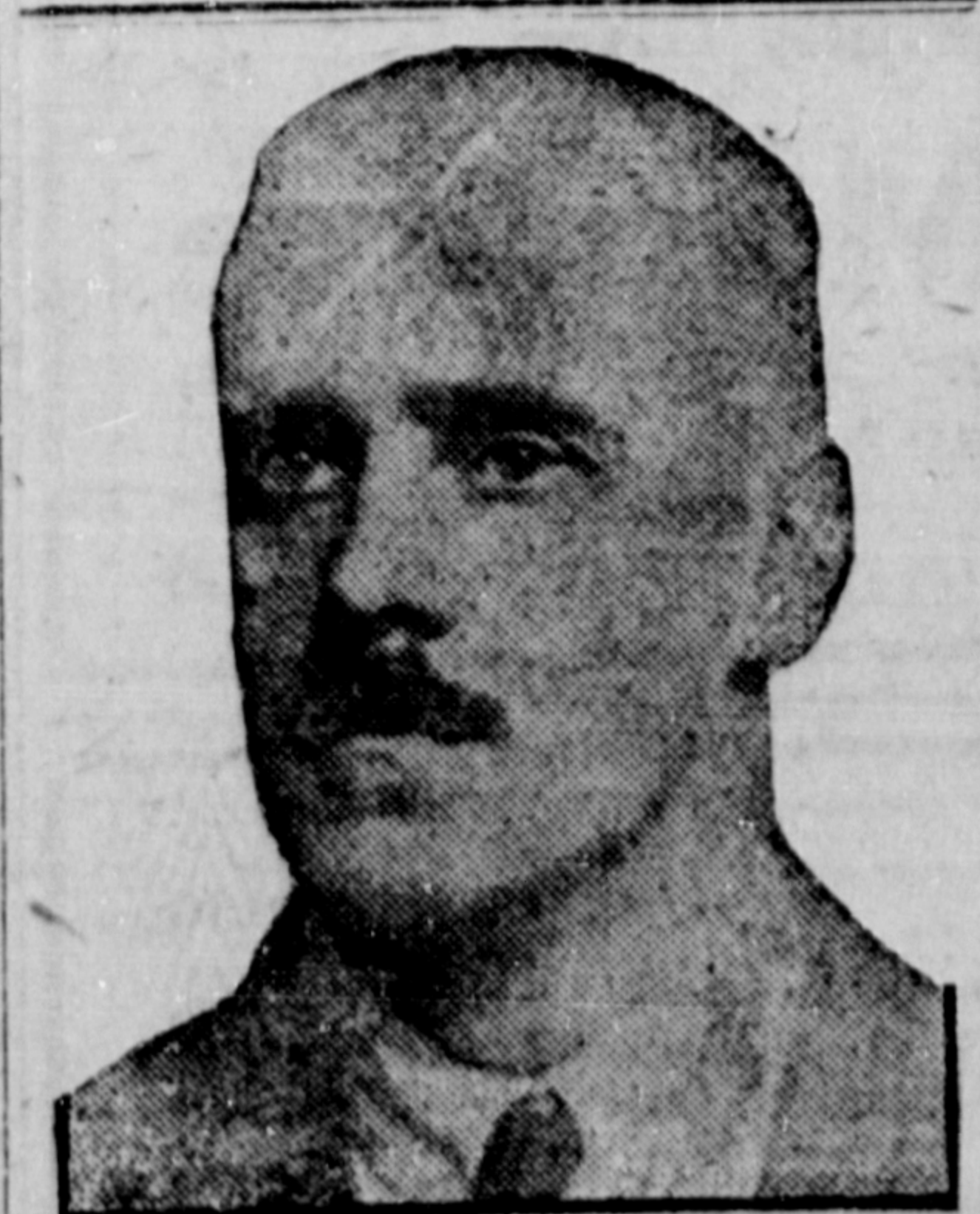
"Cruel" and "murderous" were among the adjectives employed by Senators Borah and Knox to describe the effects of the treaty on Germany and Austria.

## COMPRESSOR IS GOING IN FOR BIG WOLF MINE

Extension of Dolly Varden Railroad 2 1/2 Miles to Other Property This Spring.

ALICE ARM, B. C., Feb. 11.—A party of camp builders is all ready to proceed to the Wolf Mine, 2 1/2 miles north of the Dolly Varden and across the Kitsault River, to prepare for the installation of a ten-drill water compressor at that property. Under the terms of the Dolly Varden Mines Act, passed by the Legislature last year, the Wolf Mine also goes to the Taylor Engineering Co., on completion of the last payment to Don Cameron, the locator, who had the property partly sold to the Dolly Varden Mines Co. before they lost control of their Alice Arm holdings.

The railroad is also to be extended from the Dolly Varden to the Wolf this year, thus opening up a heavy shipper in the Wolf for the Taylor Co. as well as putting several other mines in the shipping class. The construction of the additional 2 1/2 miles to link up the Wolf will entail heavy canyon work and the Kitsault River will also have to be bridged.

The men going in now will have six feet of snow facing them at the Wolf but this will be dug out and the camps erected so that the compressor may be brought in and installed as soon as it is taken up on pack horses. The power for the compressor will be taken from Trout Creek which flows into the Kitsault River near by. The compressor will allow tunnels and raises to be driven preparatory to stopping the ore out for shipment when the railroad is complete. The development work so far on this property consists of 80 feet of tunnel and diamond drilling which has proved the high value of the mine.

## SUGAR FAMINE END IS DRAWING NEAR

Cargo of 5,000 Tons From Cuba Available This Week.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 11.—The end of Vancouver's sugar famine appears to be in sight with the arrival of the Steamer Montecarlo with 5,000 tons of raw sugar from Cuba. This is being unloaded at the B. C. Sugar Refinery and will be available to the public on Thursday.

The price of sugar has advanced a dollar a hundred pounds. Sugar now sells wholesale to dealers 14 1/2 cents a pound.

### Alcohol for Fuel.

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—The Canadian Council is recommending the manufacture of alcohol without present restrictions. It is to be used as fuel.
