

## DISCLAIMS BIG B. C. HOLDINGS OF ALVENSLEBEN

Department of State at Ottawa  
Says That His Interests Were  
Not Worth Seizing.

OTTAWA, Feb. 10.—State Department officials are taking issue with the statements in the "Toronto Globe" editorial on "The Kaiser's Political Investments" in Alberta and British Columbia, where it was stated that some millions of dollars of property was held by Alvo von Alvensleben who was later rounded up as a spy and has been interned in the United States after having escaped to that country.

A high official of the department has made the statement that instead of Alvensleben having several million dollars' worth of property tied up ready to hand over to the Kaiser, the Canadian Government has spent some thousands of dollars to learn that this and other similar stories were myths Alvensleben had lost heavily on his investments and his interests in timber and mineral rights were so small that there was next to nothing for the government to seize.
