POOR QUARTERS FOR MILITIA

It is stated that in only two out of eleven points, where units of the permanent force are stationed is accommodation adequate. At Winnipeg the militia department has secured good accommodation and at St. Johns, Que., there are suitable quarters for the one squadron of cavalry stationed there, but it cannot be said that the accommodation is suitable at Halifax, Quebec, Montreal, Kingston, Toronto, Calgary, Regina, Vancouver, or Victoria.

OTTAWA, Feb. 21.—Statistics just issued from the Department of Labor in the Dominion cabinet show the cost of food for the average family for January as \$15.30 as against \$14.73 in December last and \$13.78 in January 1918. In January, 1914, the cost was \$7.73.
