**TENDERS FOR MORSE CREEK NEW BRIDGE**

Cost Expected to be About \$18,000  
—Wooden Structure With Concrete Footings—

It was decided at last night's council meeting to call for tenders for the construction of the Morse Creek bridge in Edmonton, Vancouver and Calgary as well as locally. A set of the plans is to be sent to A. L. Carruthers, district government engineer. The new bridge connecting sections 1 and 2 will cost \$18,000 and will be a wooden structure with concrete footings.

**Sport Briefs**

Sir Thomas Lipton is brimful of confidence in the outcome of the race for the America Cup, according to an interview recently published by the London Mail. He said decisively, "I am going to win." Sir Thomas is sending a fast motor boat to the United States to try out the Shamrock.

The highest score in a basketball game was recently made in San Francisco when the Humboldt Evening School basketball team, the only night school team in San Francisco, recently defeated the Crescent All Stars by a score of 121 to 41.

The American League Baseball season will open April 14 and close October 3, according to the official schedule released by President Ban Johnson. The schedule shows a restoration of the 154 game chart which was curtailed last season on account of the war. An innovation in this year's schedule is the listing of Sunday games at New York and Washington. The opening games will be at Chicago, Cleveland, Philadelphia and Boston.

There is much ado about nothing over the threatened disorganization of big league baseball in the recent commission chairmanship wrangle. Ban Johnson still holds the helm of the league and his presence will not bring about the demise of the national pastime although his wings have probably been singed. Gun powder has been stowed away and the talcum powder is now out to primp up for the 1920 season. Ban Johnson can move around now without the specter of a process server hunting him; the Yankees can collect their thin slice of the world's series pie; Connie Mack can round up his athletes and tell them there is going to be a league this summer and Carl Herman can soon sit back in his red office and sympathize with some other poor victim who tries to please every one on the baseball family.

The National League has also adopted its 1920 schedule. It will open and close on the same dates as the American and there will be 154 games. The opening games will be Boston at New York; Philadelphia at Brooklyn; Pittsburg at St. Louis, and Chicago at Cincinnati. The other half of the league, Boston, Philadelphia, Pittsburg and Chicago, will have their openers on April 22.

The latest advices from Antwerp are that the ceremonial opening of the Olympii Stadium will take place August 14. The athletic decathlon, which was eliminated from the draft program, has now been restored. The classic pentathlon and the modern pentathlon will also be included in the program. The yachting has been provisionally arranged for June at Ostend, where the polo will also be played.

Inspector Patterson returned from the north on the Chelohsin this morning. He has been making regular departmental school inspections.
