CANNIBAL PICTURE
SPECTACULAR FILM

Ten Reels of Naked Savagery—Tropical Scenery and Thrilling Adventures.

Martin Johnson's spectacular production, "Cannibals of the South Seas," which was shown at the Westholme Theatre last night and is to be repeated tonight is a picture that should please all kinds of movie patrons.
