FEBRUARY WAS RECORD MONTH FOR BUILDING

Value Was Greater Than Any Former February-Totalled \$27,710.

The building permits issued last month from the building inspector's office in the city hall show a big increase in erection of houses in the city. The permits issued total \$27,710 divided into \$8,985 for soldiers' houses and \$18,725 in general building. All the moneys allotted for the erection of houses for returned soldiers has been granted but there are several more permits to be issued for these houses.

As compared with other years the record for this month is highly satisfactory. The permits issued in February of other years is as follows: 1919, nil; 1918, nil; 1917, \$4,150; 1916, \$10,050; 1915, 4,400; 1914, \$14,050; 1913, \$5,-375; 1912, \$7,715. Eleven permits made up the value of buildings built here last month.
